



In Memory of Lewis Bardenhagen

The College was deeply saddened by the death of Lewis Bardenhagen ('Lew' to all who knew him) on Sunday, May 25, a few short weeks after his illness had been diagnosed as terminal. Lew had fought illness for some years with enormous courage. His death was a great blow.

Lew had been senior master of English at this College for twenty-two years dating back to its High School days. His contribution to Tasmanian education generally and to English teaching, in particular, was immeasurable. Lew was a member of numerous Schools Board Committees and played a leading role in the devising of new courses at both H.S.C. and School Certificate level. One could make an exhaustive list of the various postitions Lew held, but what his colleagues will remember are the personal qualities he brought to them. Sound judgement, a willingness to listen to all points of view, the lack of any personal rancour in his dealing with others, these qualities and others made Lew a very special man and earned him the utmost respect and admiration of all who worked with him.

As an English teacher, there was no better. Literally thousands of students will testify to the benefits of Lew's scholarship and his sincere concern for their development. He is respectfully remembered by them as a teacher whose clarity of thought enabled him to articulate his delicate feel for literature, yet whose humility was evident as he genuinely listened to and valued their responses. He brought out the best in his students. In them, his spirit and achievement live on.

Lew's contribution to the life and spirit of Launceston Community College was second to none. In his quiet and unassuming way, he managed the college's biggest department, edited the college magazine, presided over the debating society and involved himself fully in the cultural and recreational programmes of the college. His background in journalism prompted his special interest in the student newspaper, "Tenet", which he nurtured over the years, and especially in this magazine, "Churinga", on which he has left his mark as its long-standing editor. As a boy, he would cycle daily to Launceston High School from Lilydale. This experience gave him both deep roots in this College and a special sympathy for country students, leading him to serve for many years on the Parkside Hostel Board. On formal occasions such as farewell assemblies, and prize-giving ceremonies, Lew was always in demand and his eloquence and dignity contributed greatly to the success and significance of these events.

Lew was a very popular staff member. Everyone warmed to his bonhomie, unaffected enthusiasm and generosity of spirit. He mixed readily and artlessly and, in return, his company was in great demand for he was a fine raconteur and a staunch friend. He would blossom at a restaurant table, surrounded by good food, good wine and good friends. Lew was a gentleman.

He was a very vital man whose enthusiasm encompassed a wide range of interests. His profound love of literature naturally came first, but his love of song was not far behind. Whether at an informal gathering or at a college assembly, a song from Lew, especially his signature song from "The White Horse Inn", could be guaranteed to bring the house down. His musical interest dated back to his boyhood performances in the Launceston Competitions, and he typically devoted many of his adult years to the organization of the Competitions as a way of "giving something back." Lew loved his cricket too, playing for his local club into his fifties. Though delighting in overseas travel, he was glad to call Tasmania home, to drive through Gould's Country to his shack at St. Helens.

He had an acute sense of justice and fair play and was a natural leader when these were threatened. On these occasions he spoke eloquently and courageously for the whole staff and their respect and admiration for him reached new heights. It was typical of his courage that, in his last days, his major concern was to put his visitors at ease.

Lew loved this College — its history, of which he was so much a part, its students, its staff. He loved Tasmania — its architecture, its flora, its life-style. Simply, Lew was a marvellous man who loved life. And we loved him. We mourn his passing.

Good-bye, Lewis. Good-bye. We all wish you a last good-bye.

This year the SRC decided to break last year's new found tradition and introduce college rugby tops instead of windcheaters.


Only one design was available, in the school colours of blue and gold with a white collar and a blue embroided LCC in the top corner.


The first week of term one was highlighted by an assembly to present awards to students who achieved outstanding results in their H.S.C. examinations.

1986 — THE YEAR OF PEACE

During this International Year of Peace, the College Peace Group has focused on creating an awareness of peace amongst the students. Numerous activities have been organised in an attempt to gain student participation.

Renowned speakers who were invited to the College have included the

Father Brian Gore, who spent a number of years working with the poor in the Philippines. He spoke about the attitudes in that troubled country, about his false arrest on a murder charge, and about "people power" — the power which individuals have when they join together in a common cause.

Dr. Keith Suter discussed how businessmen are now involved in the push for peace, referring to the Sydney based organisation known as "Businessmen for Peace". He also outlined how "we" as individuals can do more for peace.

Brother Alex McDonald, who works with the "street kids" in St. Kilda, spoke of his work with these children who are being exploited by the pornographers and drug pushers. These children are victims of our violent society.

Peter Jones, a Quaker Peaceworker, talked about how links can be made

with schools in other countries, particularly in the Soviet Union.

Film and Video lunch hours also occurred, provoking much thought and discussion.

Special "days" were held on Palm Sunday weekend and Hiroshima Day. On the former, our group participated in the rally organised by People for Nuclear Disarmament. Beforehand, we had made a number of banners. Hiroshima Day saw a peace concert, and a play which was performed by students. Balloons with peace messages were also released by children in the Mall.

A State-wide "Students For Peace" conference, held in Hobart, was attended by a number of members of our group. From this conference was formed the "Tasmanian Youth For Peace" an organisation which links all Tasmanian school and youth groups. It offers support and information through a regularly published peace paper and bi-weekly meetings.

As always, we would like to thank the teachers who have given us support and encouragement. Special thanks go to Harry Kent, John Alford, Trevor Burdon and Lance Armstrong.

ENTERTAINMENT COMMITTEE



MEN'S SOCCER


This year saw LCC win the men's soccer on Inter-College day for the first time in history.



A movement group did a piece entitled "Not Only the Feet Can Dance". This piece was a study in using space and different parts of the body to trace shapes in the air.


No concert is complete without a vocal contribution, which Steve Reed amply supplied, with a bracket of two Billy Joel songs. Go, Stevel

Overall, despite the harshness of the ground rules, we **did** enjoy ourselves and it was a great start to the May holidays.









The extent of concern at the lack of equitable participation of girls in these subject areas is demonstrated by the adoption of a national policy, in June, by the Federal and State Education Ministers, with the exception of Queensland.

As examples of the problems consider the following facts:

(a) In 1985, girls were only 38% of the students doing HSC Mathematics Level III. They were 25% of the students doing HSC Physics A Level III and 65% of the students doing Biology III.

(b) According to the 1984 CES Job Guide for Tasmania, of those job areas which require successful completion of HSC subjects for entrance to further study:


75% require or recommend Mathematics.

43% require or recommend Physics, 14% require or recommend Biology.

This means that large numbers of girls are significantly reducing the range of job choices open to them. It is essential that they leave their options open and maintain their interest in Maths and Science as they make their subject choices through their high school and HSC years. It is also extremely important to note that Chemistry is preferred to Biology as an HSC subject for nursing!

A great deal of research has been done into why most girls appear to lose interest in Maths and Science. Some has found it is to do with both the teaching methods and the subject material. For example, a majority of girls and a minority of boys prefer a co-operative teaching style to a competitive one. Many students (both fe-

males and males) are also affected by what they feel is the lack of relevance to life of what they are being taught. It has been shown that girls remain interested, in the Sciences particularly, when the material is presented in a social issues context so that they can understand the contribution and value of science and technology to the health and well-being of people. When it is presented as 'cold hard facts', many girls lose interest.









I think of Australia in terms of Tasmania because my sense of belonging is to "Tasmania" only, not "Australia" So, what I am going to write is about Tassie only.

Before I came here, I could not imagine what it was like in Tasmania, just as most of you could not imagine what it is like in Hong Kong. I only knew about the kangaroos, koala bears and apples etc.

Now Tasmania to me is still another world. First of all there is so much open space that we can only dream of in Hong Kong. The countryside, the rivers, bushes, the farms, the animals and the fresh air are such a pleasure. What amazes me most is the West Coast because it is so different from the rest of Tasmania. At any rate, I like Launceston the best in Tassie.

When I was in Hong Kong, I heard of racial discrimination in Australia. But so far I find the Tasmanians in general even more friendly than the people in Hong Kong.

Apart from my host family, school is the most important part of my AFS experience. I really envy the students here because they do not have as much study pressure as we have in Hong Kong. Believe me or not we have examinations ever since kindergarten. From Year 10 to 13 we can hardly rest because of the keen competition to get to university (there are only two universities in Hong Kong).

I have been wearing uniforms to school since kindergarten, so going to LCC is a really new experience to me. Also, LCC gives much more freedom to the students than other schools do that is what I like most about it.

LCC is so lovely. I could ask for no more - it is located near beautiful places such as the river, the Gorge and at the same time so close to town.

The first day in LCC is unforgettable. I was really nervous. Through this article I have to say thank you to all my host sister's friends, who looked after me during the first few weeks.

At that time I could hardly recognise the students whom I met, let alone their names. They all looked similar to me as all Asians look similar to you. However, in March some friends in LCC asked me what our (Asians) judgement of beauty towards both Australians and Asians was. We found out that we have more or less the same general judgement, apart from personal views.

To my surprise, there are a lot more students here who smoke and drink than in Hong Kong. Also, a lot of young couples kiss at school. Whereas in Hong Kong they never kiss in front of a whole lot of people at school.

I like the relaxed life-style in Tassie because it is always hustle and bustle in Hong Kong. It is so peaceful and free of pressure here. Besides, the crime rate is much lower, too.

When I go back to Hong Kong, I will never forget and will always miss Tassie — a place I have begun to love.


You may remember Ellen Stuart, who was a student at the College last year. She is a member of the Salamanca Theatre Company, who are at present involved in a 31/2 week tour of Tasmanian primary and high schools with Aboriginal children on the enrolment lists. They are presenting a play called "Num Lagger" (white man come), which is about the extermination of the Tasmanian Aborigines.

"Num lagger" with its all Aboriginal cast, makes some important points: firstly, that Aborigines are alive and well, and that Truganini was not the last Tasmanian Aborigine; and secondly, that Aborigines have hung together as a group with the common goal of land rights. "The idea is to make the children feel good about their past, instead of ashamed or embarrassed and to give part-Aboriginal children positive reinforcement about their heritage" according to the Co-ordinator of Aboriginal Education, Ms. Clair Anderson.

TARA VISITS **CANBERRA**



The 1986 National Capital Seminar

sponsored by The Queen Elizabeth II Silver Jubilee Trust for young Australians was held from 11th-23rd August. I

attended this seminar along with 100 other year 11 students from around Australia, three of those being Tasmanians! As the name suggests, it was held in Canberra. The programme was structured to provide young Australians with an insight into the underlying features of Western democracy. We were given information about the legislative system as well as the back-up services for Government. We were also given the opportunity to look at some of the institutions which are synonymous with the Capital, for example the High Court of Australia, the National Library. The whole programme, including food, travel, accommodation, sight-seeing was paid for by the Trust. This worked out to be \$600 per student.

The question then to ask is, was it worth \$600 per student? I feel that it was because one hundred young Australians have an understanding how our country is really run. Hopefully these 100 people will tell others and people will be more aware of Australia's Government.

The general feeling I got about Canberra was that a lot of money is being wasted there. The city looks very sterile and concrete with monumental buildings, such as the War Memorial, the High Court, Regatta Point, the half built new Parliament House which is costing far too much to build. This is paid for with our taxes. I can see the necessity for having a first class building, but it does not have to be so extravagant. The politicians could surely do without a heated indoor swimming pool, a huge Australian flag at the top of the building and other such wasteful objects, especially with our economy the way it is today, poverty

increasing and the simple fact that the majority of Australian people are having trouble with their own budgets. It seems so unfair to me that the Governor General's House is scattered with antique furniture, plush carpet, extravagant food, expensive paintings and the most expensive of everything when other people are living on a few cigarettes, one glass of milk and two punnets of hot chips a day. Seeing all of the monumental buildings, the standard of living of the Ambassadors and the Governor General and some Politicians, made me more aware of the very definite contrast in our classes of people. It is such a different reality in Canberra from places such as the back streets of Melbourne.

We were told a lot about Australia's democratic form of Government and I feel that the system we have got is the best system possible. The only thing we need to do is continually try to improve democracy. In theory it is perfect but there is still a lot to be done in practice.


We have developed some long term plans for next year as the majority of our membership shall be staying on.



BUILDINGS — AT LAST

The 1984 edition of *Churinga*, recorded a photograph of a small drill hole on the College tennis court situated on the corner of Margaret and Brisbane Streets, and noted that this was the first physical act associated with the new building development. The cover of the 1984 *Churinga* also featured plans and a sketch of the library building complex that was to be built on the site.

Now, two years later we can report that the first phase of the re-development has been completed and the new building housing Library (or Resource Materials Centre, in modern language), Business Studies Department, Technology and temporary Home Economics facilities are ready for use or are being used.

At this point of time *Churinga* proposes to look back briefly over the redevelopment and acknowledge some of the individuals who have influenced and directed the development, and to look ahead to the remainder of the programme.

The decision to re-develop the inner city site was made by the Minister for Education, Mr. Max Bingham, who visited the College shortly after the Gray Government election in 1982. He visited the College to dispel the disquiet staff felt of the proposed move of the Alanvale Campus to the city. He left promising the redevelopment of the physical facilities of the campus.

Progress has been much slower than first intimated, but at last Phase 1 has been completed and Phase 2 should be completed before the College opens in 1987.

Mr. Peter Anderson from the Department of Construction has had a large influence on the development. Peter was involved in the initial concepts and planning of the project and as well as over-seeing Phases 1 and 2, has been busy in developing the plans for Phase 3, which will accommodate Home Economics, Mathematics, Physics, Chemistry, Geography, Geology, Environmental Science, Rural Science and Biology. The tenders for the site work and piling and demolition of the existing Margaret Street properties have been advertised and work on the actual building should proceed sometime in Term 1 next year.

The quality of the re-development owes a great deal to architect and former student, Mr. Glenn Smith, who was awarded the contract to design Phase 1 of the project. Glenn has managed to capture the "cake layer" effect of the old buildings and has produced a modern version of the old with the use of coloured bricks, glass tiles, arches and gables so that the new both complements and blends with the old. His use of external circulation and the development of campus malls have set out the directions for the other phases to follow. The interior of the buildings with their colour schemes, toning carpets, and colour co-ordinated furniture and furnishings complete an outstanding facility that rivals any educational facility in Australia.

Another old scholar, Mr. Michael

Pope, from the Department of Construction has been the design architect for the gymnasium complex. Michael was confronted with the problem of placing a large double gymnasium on an inner city block. He has achieved this admirably and the two hall complex with squash courts, swimming pool, human performance laboratory, class room and offices now blends in with the Barrow Street environs. The link way to connect the gymnasium complex with the rest of the College has been designed and is awaiting funding. The Barrow Street mall is due to be developed as soon as the building work has been completed on this second phase.

Work on these first two phases has been greatly assisted by Mr. Kevin Rogers from the building section of the Education Department. Kevin has greatly assisted progress by co-ordinating work between the Education Department, Department of Construction and staff. He has also spent many hours on essential items such as furniture and equipment. His understanding and patience have been most appreciated by all who have had dealings with him.

Preliminary work has commenced on Phase 4 of the redevelopment and preliminary planning and discussions for computer studies, speech and drama, music, canteen and theatre have commenced. This development should proceed once the service block gets underway and will be followed by the refurbishing of the old library, science buildings, existing main block and the landscaping of the area. All by 1990 we hope!
