





EDUCATION EXEMPLAR

In 1895 The Bryce Report on secondary education in England, while recommending some organisational structures, pointed out that it (education) "is a thing too intimately concerned with individual(s)" to be allowed to "be destroyed by uniformity" and that "the individual teacher must be left comparatively free" in order to achieve the "chief object... the discovery of more perfect methods of teaching".

The great strengths of Launceston College, along with all of the other colleges on the senior secondary system in this State, have long been the sensitivity to the private lives of its members. Associated very closely with these has been the professional dedication and excellence of the teachers.

In this atmosphere youngsters can grow, can achieve a measure of self esteem and academic performance far beyond their own former assessment and often such as to give the complete lie to earlier predictions. They appreciate the opportunities for self expression and the teachers and colleges which make it possible.

Today, as in 1895, there are those of political and administrative mind who would wish to attain a new measure of control over the colleges, who would claim to achieve an increase in administrative efficiency by uniformity and who would rein in the freedoms and take control of the limited funding which have been the source from which such magnificent fruits have emanated.

Launceston High School was established in 1913 and very quickly through the efforts of its "individual teachers" and students acquired a reputation for excellence which deprived the non-Government schools of a prized source of income and students. The excellence and achievements of Launceston College, and the colleges generally, is today carpingly criticised as "elitism" not by outside competitors but from within the education system. Our answer must always be to continue to prove by the performances of individual students and staff, as well as harmony within the College, that independence and integrity bring unparalleled rewards to the system and the community.



OVERSEAS STUDENT PROGRAM


This year for the first time, Launceston College has eight fee paying students enrolled in year 11 and 12 courses.







JOIN GEOLOGY SEE THE STATE

To most students Geology is just a subject taught in a room off the quadrangle by a rather large, loud gent who thinks the study of rocks is all that matters in the world.

Now, while there are some fragments of truth in this statement, there is a good deal about the subject which many students never hear about - the excursions!

Spread throughout the year are six, one-day excursions which take students far and wide. The weather varies, the mus is often thick, but most importantly, the geographic highlights include the following:

1) Launceston area, but have you ever been to the boat ramp at Legana, let alone the cliffs north of it? 2) Beaconsfield area, but via Notley, Winkleigh and Flowery Gully, not to forget the site of the original settlement in the areas. Thistley Bottom! 3) To Bridport, but calling at Bangor ever heard of it? (Seems it was where the slate came from to cover Launceston's housetops last century.)

4) Scottsdale and Derby areas, but have you ever visited the delights of the Camden Road or investigated the forestry roads at the top of the Sidling?

5) Golden Valley (turn south at Deloraine) with more mud than most can imagine, icy winds straight off the snowfields and a distinct lack of public toilets.

6) Mersey Valley, passing through Nowhere Else on the way from Devil's Gate to Cethana - yes there really is such a place!

In addition to these trips, "Tiny" ran no less than nine days of excursions during weekends and holidays, either as optional extension trips for Geology students or course excursions in Advanced Geology.

The most recent such trip was a three day jaunt to the West Coast, commencing with an underground tour of the new Hellyer mine (could you mark its location on a map?). The second day saw the party enjoying the seaside at both Strahan and Trial Harbour, before driving the new Jukes Road to that well-known city of Crotty. On the way home, copious quantities of fossils were collected above Serpentine Creek - that's just north of Bronte Park.

Not every student may have learnt all the geology "Tiny" would have hoped, or collected the prescribed number of kilograms of rock specimens, but we all had a great time and certainly improved our knowledge of the State's place names.

STUDENTS MAKE IM-**PORTANT FIND!**

October 1989 saw the publication of a scientific paper which reflects well on Launceston College.

While on the Poatina excursion in August last year David Castle, assisted by Jason Orr, made a major discovery.


The bearded geologist with the builtin loud hailer halted the coach high on the mountainside and launched into his oft-repeated spiel relating to the idea that one day a student would find an important fossil in this particular rock. Out hopped the students and set to work.

When David and Jason offered "Tiny" Ewington their find at first he did not believe they had found an animal. Then, when he finally took the trouble to inspect their piece of shale, it was rapidly wrapped up and put safely

After study at both the University of Tasmania and Mines Department the find has now been fully documented and the scientific paper published.

What David and Jason found was a horse shoe crab, related to both the ancient trilobites and present day Morton Bay bugs. This small animal, about the size of a 50 cent piece, was buried in the mud while crawling around on a river mud flat some 250 million vears ago.


While one or two other horse shoe crab fossils have been found in the








Alanvale, Rosny, Hellyer and Don. From there the chance at State rep beckoned and 4

Despite a lack of players, the 1989 women's hockey team took to the field with enthusiasm and vigour.



It seeks to recognise the student whose outstanding personal achievement demands special recognition or recognises the student whose personal efforts have benefited his/her fellow students. It is interesting to note that the award in 1976 was shared between Penny Gray, who later represented Australia at Hockey, and Ralph King who was Victoria's Rhode Scholar in 1981. This year's winner is Sarah Gregg, outstanding swimmer and student.
