

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
EDITORIAL

Australia has always prided itself on the high standard of "free education" that is available to any person, regardless of individual socioeconomic background. From my point of view it appears we are heading towards a situation that will only allow the wealthy to go onto tertiary education. Will we again revert to the system where a degree is only available to those who can pay for it?

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

As this year closes I think it is fair comment to say that the Tasmanian Education Department is in turmoil. Very little remains of the senior administration of the Department as positions are eliminated and senior officers exercise their options under redundancy packages. Most of these officers are experienced personnel with many years of experience.

Within the schools and colleges, the prospect of severely reduced resources is creating the conditions for the demoralization of teachers and restricted opportunities for children. At Launceston College this comes on top of an extended period of doubt and tribulation relating particularly to senior administrative positions. And amid all this, teachers are trying to prepare for the introduction of the new Tasmainian Certificate of Education (TCE) with its associated innovative and exciting new syllabuses and assessment procedures.

It is at times like these you find out just what people are made of. It is to the immense credit of the teachers at this College that if it wasn't for what they hear and read in the media, very few students would be aware of the turmoil within the education system. Our teachers are obsessive in their determination to do the best they can for their students. While this may disadvantage teachers in the industrial arena, at the same time it provides a shield for both teachers and students against some of the most undesirable outcomes of our economic and industrial disarray.

Consequently 1990 may not have been one of our greatest years, but it has still become of considerable achievement. Enrolment has been at a record level and we are now the biggest secondary college in the State. Students have continued to win prizes and scholarships and to have success on the sports field. Despite some minor traumas early in the year, the new Science and Computing buildings are now in full use. They provide us with first class teaching facilities and it is pleasing to note that the quality of the buildings is ap-

preciated by students. Steps

are now being taken to upgrade the Music and Drama facilities although these improvements can only be seen as stop-gap measures.

Publications such as this magazine are interesting when first published but perhaps each addition (should this be edition? - Womble) gains in significance with age as it brings back memories to past students. I sincerely hope that this year's leavers can look back at their years at the College and recall them as pleasant and profitable times.

President's Report 1990







The diversity of the teams and the number of students involved in them, illustrate the high degree and value of talent that our students possess. 



YOUNG ACHIEVERS

As Gilbert K. Chersterton once said, "The successful businessman (or woman as the case may be) sometimes makes his money by ability and experience; but he generally makes it by mistake." Such was the case for the group of Launceston College students who, through the year, became involved in a program called Young Achievement Australia.

Young Achievement began in the United States in 1919 and spread to Australia in 1977 and since its introduction 26000 young Australians have been involved. Such a program exists to provide an opportunity for HSC students around Australia to learn about free enterprise, initiative, inventiveness and productivity.

It provides the opportunity for young people to establish a real business by marketing a good or a service. Funding is made available by selling a maximum of 500 sponsor share certificates at two dollars each. Each member holds a position in the company such as Managing Director, Company Secretary etc. Each group consists of ten to fifteen members and is sponsored by a local business which provides a group of experienced advisors to guide the young entrepreneurs.

The students from Launceston College were divided into three companies to join students from other participating schools such as Alanvale College, Grammar and Scotch Oakburn.

The products which the com-

panies chose to market basically centred around stationery items. The Young Achievers of the City of Launceston (YACOL), sponsored by the City Council, marketed an all-inclusive gift wrapping set.


The group sponsored by Bass and Equitable Society produced scented gift cards. Tassie Holdings sponsored by Launceston Tubemakers marketed a personalised stationery set.

Meetings were held once a week at the sponsor companies with technical business debates concerning matters such the colour of ribbon etc. (the sort of stuff that needs careful deliberation). At times there were some serious difficulties but overall, the program was a worthwhile

experience and immensely valuable in providing an insight into the real business world. A programme highly recommended for both year 11 and 12 students of 1991 to consider, especially if you are interested in pursuing a career in business. It is also a great opportunity to meet new friends and establish contacts in the business community.

Thanks must be expressed to Dave Newman who made this opportunity available to us; Harley Russel, the coordinator of Young Achievement in Tasmania and a special thank you to the sponsor companies and the wonderful advisors who were so supportive and knowledgeable.


course in edition three, there was that rather tantalising photograph; yes, there are some of us who call a photograph a photograph and not a "picture".

IMPRESSIONS OF TASMANIA

Ladies and Gentlemen, no matter what nationality you are; where you are from; or where you are living, I am sure that you will be very interested in the following... I am an A.F.S. Exchange student from Hong Kong, in the past eight months, I have discovered lots of differences between the culture of Australia and Asia. Do you what to know what they are? Good! Let's have a look at the things that have made the biggest impressions on me during my stay in Tasmania.

First of all, of course, is the way of eating... Australians will use forks and knives, and of course a plate. The Chinese and the Japanese use chopsticks and bowls. Thais use forks and spoons. The Indonesians only use their hands. Let's look at their menus:

Australians: Mainly meat for dinner. You should not use your own utensils to put food on to your plate. Only one dish as main course.

Asians: Mainly rice meals for dinner. All the meals; which have more than one main courselike in Australia are placed in the centre of the table and one uses their own chopsticks to pickup what one likes. Asians prefer hot food, nearly five meals a day are all hot: noodles, rice soup....YUM!

Know let's talk about Mac-

Donald's: In Tasmania there is only one

MacDonald's. If you do want a burger you will have to take a two to three hour trip to Hobart to get one. Terrible. In Hong Kong, MacDonald's are everywhere. Nearly ten in each district centre. Over a hundred in all! Don't forget that Hong Kong is sixty times smaller than Tasmania. Sixty times!!

Then there is the way people blow their noses: Australians, as everyone realises will blow their noses whenever and wherever they need to. No matter if they are infront of people... hanky out... *Bpfffff...* put hanky away. Asians will try and avoid blowing their noses in front of people. However, there are two methods which are used:

People from Hong Kong and the Japanese: Use a tissue and dry their nose or go to a place where there is no one and blow their nose. Remember, they are using tissues and throwing them in the

sniff, sniff... then, they wipe
their nose on themselves

Nextly, let's look at the way that they show their moods:

Australians: Most of them are quite exaggerated, they show out their happiness or unhappiness. They will laugh loudly and cry loudly.

Asians: They will try and hide their moods. They won't

either laugh or cry loudly. They will keep silent and quiet.

Now, the next section I hope you will find very interesting. Many students who have either a boyfriend or girlfriend will be please to learn that they luck that they live here in Tasmania as things are very different elsewhere...In Australia, boys and girls can walk hand in hand, walk closely etc. even at school and in public. However, in Asia eventhough the boy / girlfriends are studying together at the same school, they can't walk hand in hand etc. Therefore, one can not really say who has a boy/ girlfriend since they are not allowed to carry out their relationship in school.

School discipline. I enjoy studying here. Here there is much more freedom than back home in Hong Kong. In Australia, school discipline is very laxed. There are no uniforms for secondary colleges like L.C. There are no bells after or before a lesson. Teachers and students can make jokes and laugh together. In Asia however, it is very strict. One must wear a uniform. One must obey the one hundred odd rules. Every lesson starts with the ringing of the bell and ends with it. Students must respect their teachers, everything the teachers say is unquestionable.

All the information herein I have obtained through observations during my eight month stay in Launceston.


Our small Woodwind Ensemble has provided music for lunch-time activities, both in the library and the Assembly Hall.

INTER-COLLEGE DAY







STUDENTS IN HONG KONG

"WE HAD A FANTASTIC TIME IN HONG KONG"

The purpose for our going to Hong Kong was to take part, along with representatives from 10 other countries, in a world conference. The conference went really well with Sally and myself making a presentation on Environmental Conservation and Andrew one on World Peace.

"Did you have a good trip?" is understandably the question we are most commonly asked. Well yes! We had a very good trip but it was more than just good. Unlike the typical tourist, we were lucky enough to experience and participate for a short time in a different culture and way of life. It is really hard to put into words just what it was like but I will do my best in as few words as possible.

Along with the four Australians there were 200 participants; 60 international representatives and 140 local participants. We lived together in a large camp on Hong Kong Island. To be surrounded literally 24 hours a day by people from countries as contrasting as Argentina and Great Britain, Germany and India, Thailand and Russia, Australia and Macau, all with such completely different cultures but all of us with common concerns for the world. It was a fantastic experience. You could almost feel an energy connecting us all together, there were no feelings of barriers and even language differences were not an obstacle. I am sure I speak on behalf of Sally and Andrew when I say that we made some very, very close friends who will remain friends forever no matter what happens between our countries or governments.

A FEW THINGS WE WON'T FORGET IN A HURRY

Sally, along with one representative from each country, wrote and recorded a song, each person singing part of the song in his/her own language. The song is played regularly on Hong Kong radio to an audience of some 4 million people.

Andrew and Nick (another Australian participant), with only five minutes notice, sang *I was only nineteen* before an audience of about 40 000 people at the Cultural Village. To make their act of bravery even more impressive they sang straight after the Australian band *Indecent Obsession* had played. Personally, I think Andrew and Nick were better.

For me it was an unforgettable experience to hear from two German girls, one from West Germany and one from East Germany, who described the coming down of the wall dividing East and West Germany. It is one thing to hear about it on the news but quite another to see the excitement and emotion in the eyes of two people who lived on opposite sides of the wall, and experienced the whole event. We learnt so much about the geography, politics and social life of the different countries just by being with the other participants.

After the conference was finished, Andrew went on to Japan for 10 days and will return in December to teach English for six months.

Sally, Nick and I stayed on in Hong Kong for 10 days with the Germans. We spent some time in a youth hostel up Mount Davis and we stayed a couple of days and a night on a beach on an outlying island. We also visited Macau, a small country under the control of Portugal.

All in all we had a great time and are looking forward to meeting our new friends in the not too distant future. We would like to thank Dave and Merren for making it possible for us to go. We really did appreciate it.





For the sixth year running the Fun Run was held at the end of the first term. As always, the Fun Run was a very successful event, with about 250 students and staff members taking part in completing the




dead cabbage! All this and more for \$67.50 per week.



ACADEMY SCHOLARSHIP

AUSTRALIAN DEFENCE FORCE ACADEMY

Five students from Launceston College have so far reached the final stage of selection for the Australian Defence Force Academy, that is they have been accepted pending their end of year results. Alison Westwood, Stuart Mallet, Douglas Mallet, Angela Beyer and Richard Alberts are the successful students who have been chosen for possible officer careers in the Navy and Air Force, with Army selections yet to be completed.

Every year the three services also offer 50 scholarships each to HSC students intending to follow such careers. Applications are submitted in year 11 and students who win this award receive \$1,000 in year 12. There are no bonds involved concerning the students' use of the money, but it is essentially intended to help with studies.

Competition is very high with over 140 applicants Australia-wide for the Navy scholarship alone this year and even more for entry into the Academy. It is therefore important to develop good personal qualities and extra curriculum activities, along with normal studies.

Academically, a requirement of at least six Level III subjects must be obtained to be considered for the Academy, although emphasis is placed on even higher grades. Subjects must also be relevant to either Arts, Science or Engineering degrees which are offered by the Forces.

A high standard of fitness is a major aspect of any form of military life. Involvement in individual or team sports on a regular basis is important for those seeking an officer career. In addition, applicants must be medically fit in order to pass entry.

Many do not realise the fact that all three services offer training in the skills and knowledge of each individual service in Launceston and other major centres throughout Australia. Naval Reserve Cadets, for example, gives those between the ages of 13 and 19 the opportunity to learn basic sailing, rifle training, discipline and seamanship aspects of Navy life. Any involvement in these areas is highly beneficial as an introduction to the life of an officer in the Armed Forces and to be competitive against other applicants in the extensive selection processes of the ADFA. It is not an easy path, but high rewards and job satisfaction make this career choice attractive.



STUDENTSTRIKE

The Politics of Education...

When people say that college life is an educational experience they are nearer to the truth than they expect. 1990 has seen staff and students become intimately acquainted with the mechanics of governmental bureaucracy. First term saw the opening of the new sciences block on the northern side of the campus. Built to replace the medieval labs and theory rooms off the quadrangle, the opening of B block was awaited eagerly by everyone.

During the first day address by Acting Principal, Col Lane, students were told that in the interests of welfare and education the Administration of the College had decided to open B block before its completion. However, pleased staff and students soon realised that there were serious inadequacies in many areas.

Complaints were lodged by students to staff, by staff to College administrators and

from there to the Education Department. Finally, the conditions became so bad that the SRC decided to use the students' right of protest and began organising strike action. It became obvious that despite the complaints conditions in some subject areas were impossible and even dangerous to staff and students, and these conditions were being overlooked or ignored.

Previous excuses used by the contractor, College and Government (for example the pilot and trade union strikes, the unavailability of materials etc etc...) suddenly evaporated; options that had been unviable were now taken into consideration. Repairs which had, a week before, been impossible were now completed, but not to the extent or satisfaction of the SRC. Only a few minor repairs had been completed... there was a list of forty others still to be looked at. The strike was to go ahead.

In early March approximately 500 students crowded into the plaza to listen to and vote


on proposals put forward by SRC President Matthew Healey. After hearing the list of complaints and the possible avenues of action open to the students, a series of votes was taken. As a result the students decided not to continue with strike action, but to boycott the rooms which were inadequate, until they were fixed. Col Lane, who originally declined to speak, was called upon. He praised the SRC for their actions but urged them to remember B block was opened early because the old class rooms were no longer suitable to teach or study in.

The results of the strike are still not crystal clear. Students now know that they do have a voice and a means of expressing their grievances. How much of the physical repair work and safety precautions are still to be completed is anyone's guess, but enough came about because of the strike to make teaching and study in B block a bearable, if not enjoyable, experience.

The trip was very safe and a whole new and wonderful expe-


party who had not previously been caving.

L.C. unleashed two teams trained in secret martial arts





As this was the first year that Olympic Weightlifting has been a part of the Talented Athletes Program, we as a team are very happy with the results we have gained.




Of the six lifters who began the year, only four still remain. Throughout the year, we recruited two more lifters, one of them being female.



Thanks to "Pezza" (Darren Perry) the entire team was


outfitted along with the rest of the Talented Athletes Programme.Pompoms were made by team members at a working bee during the Easter break.

Major Events



So much for progress.


