





THE ANTI RACISM COMMITTEE.

The Anti Racism Committee was initially formed in Launceston. There are two branches, one in the city, and the other in based here at the college. A student, Kerry Neil, is the head of the Committee. The following are some of her thoughts on the Committee and its objectives.

What is the main focus of the Anti Racism Committee?

The Anti-Racism Committee's main focus is on educating people, in a non-violent manner, on equality. We believe that everybody is equal, regardless of their skin colour, nationality or race. Unfortunately, racism today is very pronounced, yet it is much less blatant than it was in the '50's' and '60's'. It lies within the hearts and minds of many people, hidden behind a veil of respectability. We strive to remove the myths and lies that people are mistaking for truth, to ask that we all see each other as human beings and treat each other with the respect and love every person deserves.

What type of a result do you endeavour to achieve?

We mainly endeavour to encourage people to think. To seriously look into their hearts and what they believe and why they believe it. We hope to encourage average, everyday people to realise that their actions do have consequences. If we want to live in a caring world we must realise that it is we who make it that way.

What problems have you encountered on your journey so far?

Personally, I've encountered a lot of prejudice and bigotry. I have been subjected to name calling and threatened that I would have a cross burned in my yard, Ku Klux Klan style. When I first formed this group in 1994, I put up hundreds of posters promoting the group. In the end I had to take down each and every poster as they were all covered in Nazi swastikas or racist slurs.

What do you personally hope to gain from this experience?

The main thing that I personally hope to gain is a happier and kinder place to live in. A place where people aren't judged on whether they're black or white, rich or poor, but how they behave. The greatest thing for me is to see that I have done something positive. To see other people treating others with respect and kindness, and knowing that I helped promote that, and that I didn't just sit by and do nothing. I guess, essentially, I hope to strive continually to become a better person and hopefully encourage others to do the same. That's what's important.

The Anti Racism Committee is an informal group concerned with getting as much good done as possible. They are always open to suggestions and ideas on how to promote equality

CHRISTIAN FELLOWSHIP



THE BREAKFAST CLUB



The Breakfast Club met every Tuesday morning and was a great opportunity for students to catch up on gossip while having something healthy to eat which they otherwise probably would not have eaten.



RECREATION

What is the program all about?

The Recreation Program endeavours to offer a range of services, activities and, as a consequence, achieve maximum participation from students enrolled at the College. The goal is that every LC student will have the opportunity to participate in some form of recreational pursuit and to have access to the services and information that the program co-ordinator can provide. Recreation is not easily defined, as it involves many facets. It can, however, be defined into the areas of offering activities, pursuits and sport; providing information about recreational opportunities outside of college hours; co-ordinating teams to represent the College, and organising one off events.

Providing links with the community

The Rec Program offers opportunities for students to link up with outside recreation and sporting pursuits. This is achieved by advertising events and then coordinating interested students to be a part of the activity. In turrn, community groups utilise the Recreation Officer as a means through which to advertise their interests. The following provide examples of how the Recreation Program accomplishes this:

Peer Support

After much initial interest, numbers narrowed down to a small group of girls who regularly attend Mayfield Primary School once a week and help out with whatever activities the class are working on. Some of the girls' comments help to describe the experience;

"It's a good experience and it's helping me to decide if I want to choose teaching as a career."

The Sports Committee

The Sports Committee was a small group of enthusiastic students who worked with me, as the Recreation Officer, to help suggest and run activities for the program. These students provided a valuable link between students and staff and helped to establish student needs. The 1997 committee included Mark Blundell (who is also on the Executive and represents the Sports Committee), James Smith, Andrea Bonning, Robin Tait, Jason Roberts, Rachael Brain, Stuart Davis and Kylie Bruce.



Activites and Sports

A variety of activities and sports has been offered throughout the year. Some were well patronised, while others had much interest but no action! Some things were offered but were not viable without the numbers. In the early days of the program this year, I realised that students have a fear of what is formal and structured. The less ties, the better! I also discovered that for the majority, hanging out in the Gym at lunchtime was a more attractive social issue than the need to get really hot, sweaty and smelly (although they many did achieve this last objective without trying!). This, of course, is a healthy approach to recreation, so the Gym was frequently utilised as a social recreational hangout. The following sports were offered in the lunchtime recreation times throughout the year; waterpolo, indoor soccer, badminton, basketball, indoor cricket, rockclimbing. indoor hockey, volleyball and table tennis. The weights room, open three lunch hours a week, was used consistently under the guidance of David Johnson. Pool, spa and sauna, open every day, were always a popular places. Achieving an A Course

Many students who participated in a specific recreational pursuit for much of the year have been eligible to apply for accreditation in one of the many recognised A syllabus units. 




some of the games with his offensive rebounding.

TREKKING IN NEPAL

Another group of intrepid students are heading to Nepal at the end of the year. While they are not planning to scale the heights of a peak the size of Everest in search of thin air, they do intend to immerse themselves in the sights, sounds, smells and tastes of this small Himalayan kingdom, squeezed between Tibet and In-

The expedition consists of a group of five students from Launceston College and one from each of Don College and Grammar, along with teachers Mick Ling (LC), Kathleen Pleasants (Don) and Tony Mckenny (Taroona High School). Students will gain accreditation in the TCE subject, International Travel-Applied (an A course) and either Recreational Activities (an A course) or Expedition B, depending on their Adventure Education enrolment.

Once again, product assistance has been generously provided by Bolle (discounted sunglasses and hats), Mars Confectionery (free Mars bars, M&M's and hats!) and Launceston outdoor equipment retailers, Mountain Creek and Allgoods Bush Hut. Students have been very appreciative of this sponsorship as it has ensured they have the appropriate clothing and equipment for the trip. As for the Mars product, apart from tasting great, they provide a welcome morale booster when energy levels are low.

On arriving in Kathmandu, students are briefed about the trek, apply for trekking permits and prepare their kit bags. With over a day remaining before commencing the trek, time is spent exploring the cultural, religious and historical features in and around Kathmandu and refining bargaining skills while shopping. Of note are visits to the largest and most significant Buddhist temple in Kathmandu, the Bodnath stupa, the most important place of Hindu worship, Pashupatinath, the old cities of Bhaktapur and Patan, and numerous handicrafi workshops for metalware, jewellery, carpets, thanka painting and wood carvings.

The trek itself, involves a twelve day circuit route in the Annapurna region, west of Kathmandu, following remote trails through luxuriant forest and traditional villages with magnificant views of the Annapurna and Dhaulagiri ranges. The trek will broaden the students' range of experiences - physical, social, cultural, intellectual and environmental. It will include contact with local people and village life. There is a mix of middle and high hill walking with spectacular gorges and mountain scenery and an ascent of a small peak. Students will be involved as much as possible in the planning and organisation before and during the trek. A three day wildlife safari in the Royal Chitwan National Park will follow



From here it was on to Cape Barren where the boys engaged in pine cone warfare with some of the young locals before we moved on to the new Aboriginal Community Centre. The new centre was most impressive, especially with the magnificent Cape Barren Goose engraved in the pavement outside and the intricate detail of the paving in the courtyard with its wonderful use of colour and Aboriginal designs.


Day two saw us frantically looking for Killicrankie diamonds only to have our dreams of fortune and a non return to Launceston quickly dashed when we dug up half the beach to discover very little at all. So it was a quick swim at Palana while Marie and Sandra looked for shells. Their search will hopefully yield some bracelets for the girls, to be made by one of our local Aboriginal elders, Aunty Dulcie. After Palana we visited the historic sight of Wybalenna, the chapel and the museum at Emita. Wybalenna, with its sombre and eerie aura, evoked many emotions as Alice told us of the tragic history of this site for Aboriginal people. That evening we drove to Walker's Lookout for a magnificent view of the Bass Strait Islands.

The trip had many highlights for us, including learning more about our history and getting to know one another and our two wonderful teachers. Lowlights would have to include Marie's refusal to drive over 60kmh (despite all our encouragement, whinging and moaning) and Sandra driving over a dead wombat and filling the car with a stench that remained with us for the duration of the trip. I could also mention the wonderful videoing, with our perceptive comments, the boys' cooking, our inability to get to sleep in the evenings and lots more. The date was set, bags packed, snow on the hills and the forecast was bad, the best ingredients of human sardines.



In the final phase of the school year five classes were engaged in preparing all our learned skills and knowledge for the Practical Assessments necessary for pre-tertiary awards.


It is also interesting to reflect on just how many professional productions we've been to see this year. Attending live theatre performances is a vital part of our courses.

We've enjoyed it a lot!



ARTS ACCESS WEEK!





STUDENT ACCOMMODATION

PARKSIDE

Parkside is a student hostel, run by the LC Council. It caters for country students from all over Tasmania, including Flinders and King Island. Students must be studying at Launceston or Newstead College or Tafe. Parkside's maxim capacity is forty five students and this year there are around thirty five residents. For those who wish (Or those who don't have a choice, like the King Islanders), there is the option of seven day boarding. However, most people choose to stay five nights a week.

The hostel closes on school holidays and long weekends and all residents must go home (except for the managers, who live there). There are two managers and three supervisors who try to keep a little bit of order. Leonie, the cook, comes four nights per week, and cooks the evening meal.

There are many facilities including a games room, with an eight ball and table tennis table. A snack and drinks machine, is available for those who wish to use them. There is also a kitchenette, with all the food, that might like to be eaten in between main meals. It would be rare to find a television, light, or heater off. The general atmosphere at Parkside is friendly, with only the standard rules, like no alcohol, smoking on the premises etc. Parkside is a good place to stay, and if it wasn't there, a lot of us wouldn't be able to continue our education.

VILLAS

The Villas are located on Elizabeth street and are part of LC's student accommodation program. Students studying at LC, Newstead or Tafe are allowed to apply and can live there as either 5 or 7 day borders.

They consist of 13 self contained units and are able to cater for up to 30 people. Each unit has either two or three, the majority being the latter, bathroom, TV, microwave, oven, lounge suite and much much more. A communal laundry and a drinks machine are available.

Residents basically look after themselves and create their own homely environments. For those who don't like the idea of doing all your own cooking and cleaning, then the villas probably aren't for you, yet the up side is you basically, get to do what you want, like, when and what you eat. - For some pizza five days a week.

Two managers and two supervisors that also live at the villas provide minor supervision. There are rights and responsibilities (rules) that students have to abide by, but overall, the villas has a friendly atmosphere and would be a great place to live

BAIN TERRACE





Every Monday a little group of singers go up to the music rooms and sing. (Now that's a scary thought.)


Nothing has been happening all year and "You can't expect to be a star if you're not gonna to shine!"

BENDIGO VISIT



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
INTERNATIONAL STUDENTS


When I came home I didn't have time to study because I had to help my mama on the farm. There was no time to rest.




This is the third year of operation of this more flexible way of studying at LC. However following the Department's review of the School of Distance Education in 1996, all Year 11 and 12 students who could not attend daytime classes were referred to their local colleges for Open Learning and this has led to rapid expansion statewide. The Colleges are working together in partnership to provide the best possible service to all.

Our Open Learning students range from traditional home schooling students and young single parents who study from home, to students who live in isolated areas, or who work in their own time to fit their studies around full or part-time work. We have many mature age students returning to study after leaving school early, or working to upgrade their skills and qualifications as part of a change in career or to improve their job prospects. As well, a number of our regular students have chosen to study one or more of their subject through Open Learning, and this will be an increasing trend in the future.

All staff on the Open Learning team have enjoyed working in this new, more flexible way. It is satisfying to be able to meet the needs of students who have previously not been able to access Senior Secondary Education, and we have met some really interesting and committed students, who are taking full advantage of the opportunity.

The future looks bright indeed - we will be moving to a new, more accessible Open Learning Centre next year, Telstra has just entered into a substantial sponsorship to help us move to on-line delivery in the near future for those with access to computers, and the statewide network will be even stronger next year.

The remainder of the class-rooms were single storey timber buildings were on stilts, on the western side of the school grounds. To the right there was a large expanse of ground used as a sports oval. To the side of the oval was the community swimming pool, which doubled as the school training pool. The place was flat, tree-less, and in summer hot, and cold and windy in winter.

As the school was for boys only, Mr. Vickery was determined to resist the change to co-education at all costs. There were a few attempts to get girls to come over from Port Adelaide girl's school, to take classes with boys, and if you could have seen the lengths that the staff went to, to keep boys and girls apart, so that our studies were not distracted.....

Well this is how it went.

In class desks were arranged in four straight rows all facing the front. The girls marched in, and were seated in the two centre rows, and the boys would not sit until the girls had. At lunch and recess times there was a part of the yard set aside for the girls and it was patrolled by teachers, that could have given Marines lessons about patrolling the 39th (Korea) parallel. The most bizarre part of the rituals that went on in front of the girls was how the boys treated them while they were on the school grounds.

It was as though aliens were now residing with us, and lets face it, girls can act pretty alien at times. The boys were stunned to silence whenever the girls came near, and we, using peer pressure before it became fashionable, tried to pressure each other into approaching one of the girls over the 39th parallel. When I look around the Launceston College I see a glimmer of the way things used to be. The old main buildings with the old fashioned assembly hall. The pictures of past principals. The ghosts of school past is still hauntingly present.

When I try to draw comparisons to then and now I find more contrasts. School discipline was strict and severe to persistent offenders. I was one of those who persisted. Maybe if I had been more attentive to my school have learned thirty years ago.

Seriously, in today's schools students have the worlds at there fingertips. With the advances in information technology, study should and could be a breeze. Things are being taught in school now that apply to the outside world, that we didn't know until we were thrust out the doors at the end of our school years.

Thirty years ago the only drug on school grounds was a cigarette. You could buy a packet of 10's for less than twenty cents, or at the local shop would sell you one smoke for two cents. Now we see the dramatic drugs. The likes of crack, cocaine, grass, and so on. They have became fashionable alternatives to life. I guess it comes down to the supply and demand principle.
