FROM THE PRINCIPAL

To that end the Launceston College structure has undergone close examination this year, and the New Year will see profound changes as we capitalise on a review process that has included stakeholders across the spectrum. I am firmly committed to our goal that Launceston College will facilitate and clearly evidence student outcomes of the highest level.

The year of review has seen valuable contributions from students, from the perspective of direct representation and contribution and simply due to the fact that our students are in general highly motivated and disciplined and therefore facilitate the organization looking forward. Thanks to all those wonderful students who have enriched the life of the College and of their fellow students throughout this year.

The chance to work in an organization with such a talented group of young adults (some of whom have survived me as principal of their primary school or high school and in some worst case scenarios – both!) is a privilege, one that I don't take lightly.

To those students who are leaving the College this year, my very best wishes for all to which you aspire. To those students who are studying at Launceston College in 2003, return with the understanding that expectations of you increase as the years progress. So relax, enjoy the break.


VET&E SECTOR REPORT

- conducting oneself in a professional manner.


To our students, congratulations on a great year and a big pat on the back for your hard work, diligence and talent. Indeed 2002 was a "good year".




















STAFF ART EXHIBITION








Directors of events are also to be thanked for their organisational skills and making sure their events ran smoothly.







OUR POLICEMAN






In short, I am here to help you all if and when you feel you may need my assistance.

INTERNATIONAL BACCALAUREATE





The International Baccalaureate (IB) Diploma provides a qualification that is internationally recognised. It is widely accepted across Australian and international universities including the University of Tasmania. The diploma includes a range of subjects across all areas, ensuring a broad education and the Theory of Knowledge, Extended Essay and Creativity, Action, Service (CAS) component complete the holistic nature of the program. Launceston College is one of only four government schools which offer the program in Australia, and one of only two schools in Tasmania.

Students who are studying the IB have diverse reasons for having chosen this alternative pre-tertiary qualification. Some have specific career pathways including Medicine, Engineering, Physiotherapy, Teaching and general scientific enquiry; and others want to study overseas while some are unsure about what they would like to do; the IB allows them to keep their options open.

In 2002 there are 24 students enrolled in the IB Diploma at Launceston College and it is anticipated that these numbers will continue to grow next year. This year students have been involved in the Edward de Bono week, Theory of Knowledge Camp at Maria Island, College production, IB Festivale and various community activities as part of their CAS component of the diploma.





COUNSELLORS' REPORT

I'm Frank Sernaggia, the Country Student Liason officer. My role this year has been to support the students who have joined our school community from outside the Launceston region. The College recognises the huge commitment these students make just to be a student furthering their education faraway from home. We have over 300 country-based students at LC.

I make contact with the students in grade 10 and am heavily involved with their transition from country high school to College. Many support staff are available to country students, once they arrive at LC. I discuss accommodation, financial and personal issues with the students. My task is to liaise with whoever can support them best. I also act as a link between their high school and parents. I have spent 12 of my 20 years teaching in schools that are outside Launceston. I am amazed at their capacity to deal with the enormous transition they make in not only coming to Launceston, but to LC. It is very easy to walk down the hill from West Launceston to come to school- it is a different matter to travel 30 minutes to catch a bus, then travel for over an hour to get to school, and do the same to get home. It shows commitment and dedication, which should be applauded.


I'm Steve Cloudsdale, and I am the College Chaplain, a vital part of the Student Services Team. I provide a unique input into the College community, and as a representative Christian, I am available to more than just the students, I am available to the whole College community. The Chaplaincy Committee has been planning creatively for the future, with involvement from Fusion.

Hi, I'm Michelle Haysham, the LC social worker. I provide information about Centrelink, housing agencies, health and counselling agencies available in the local community. I give support to students at times when they need someone to talk to.

Hi, I'm Deb White, the Guidance Officer at LC. What I do here at LC is help students deal with stuff that is a bit beyond what you would talk to your PC teacher about. I deal with a wide range of issues, which fall into two categories. One is managing the study load, including time/stress management and dealing with exam anxiety, and managing learning disabilities. The second has more to do with personal issues, such as relationships, family/parent problems, feelings of isolation, depression, loneliness, anger ... you name it we tackle it. I aim to help the students sort out their own problems, I don't fix them for them. I am not just here to help people with problems, but to be here to have a chat to anyone, about anything.













CERTIFICATE 1. IN WORKPLACE SKILLS

The major focus of the Certificate 1 in Workplace Skills program is to assist students to explore their own 'possible' career pathways and to build up skills, knowledge and resources in order to gain employment.

This year we have had students who have chosen to work as landscape gardeners, mechanics, child carers, chefs, painters, spray painters and receptionists and in other areas such as retail, manufacturing, hospitality and tourism. Quite a few students have gained either full-time, part-time or casual employment as a result of their impressive performance in the workplace.

The college component of this program has students working on gaining skills and accreditation in Occupational Health and Safety, First Aid, Enterprise, Information Technology and Career Planning while continuing to develop literacy and numeracy skills with particular reference to the workplace. We try to ensure that the delivery of these units is interesting, varied and relevant to the workplace.

Therefore we have:

- visited worksites to see how the principles of Occupational Health and Safety are applied
- undertaken practical First Aid training with St John's
- worked with National Joblink to develop skills in resume preparation and interview techniques
- designed and made craft articles, jewellery and furniture pieces as part of the LC Enterprise at the Launceston Show.

A really important bonus of the CWS program is that students and staff quickly form a supportive working environment. To assist in this area we have had class barbecues at the Hoo Hoo Hut and Tamar Island, lots of morning and afternoon teas and lunches prepared by the students. We have also held a few pizza and video sessions, gym sessions and, to end the year, a trip to Bridport to celebrate our successes and the friendships we have formed.























YOUNG MOTHERS @ LC




















MATHS RELAY

2002 has been a busy and exciting year in the Mathematics area.

The Mathematics staff at the College have continued to support their students by offering lunchtime tutorials to students throughout the entire year. While there has been no compulsion for students to attend these sessions they have given many students the opportunity for one to one assistance with any difficulties that they may have experienced.

Until September lunchtime tutorials were held each Monday to provide extension work for students interested in competing in the many mathematical challenges which arise during the year. These tutorials gave the students the opportunity to practise and improve their problem-solving skills.

On August 18th Launceston College hosted the Northern division of the Mathematics Relay competition which is run by the Mathematical Association of Tasmania. This event was highly successful with over 200 students from primary to senior secondary level competing. Five teams from Launceston College took to the field and all the team training together with quick thinking and a series of rapid 'baton' changes saw the teams finish first, second, third, fourth and sixth in the Northern Senior Secondary Section. The combination of Nathan Murray, Sandy Tian, Luke Paine and Nick Broomhall proved to be a winning one as they not only finished first in the North but equal first with Elizabeth College in the State Senior Secondary Section.

Forty Launceston College students participated in the 2002 Australian Westpac Competition with excellent results; 19 credits, 6 distinctions and one high distinction. Ziming Gao achieving the high distinction, placed her in the top 2%.




The Mathematics Department would like to congratulate all their students on an excellent year's work and wish them good luck in their exams and for the future.

Next year the programs of Certificate in Land Management and Conservation will be added to the variety of Primary Industry programs.








'B' TEAM

SKATEBOARDERS














Skating at LC is a fairly big thing. We have skateboarders who are in the Red Herring Team and members competing in the X games in November.

Working with Children C

Australia-wide recognised training, helped me decide on a career, 2 lines devoted to my favourite area of learning, experience in the real world.


Skills I have learnt?

OPEN LEARNING

Open Learning has had a very successful year. For the first time this area of the college has been a sector in its own right. This has allowed us to set very clear priorities and refine many of our processes. Open Learning has continued to attract a large of number of students and in terms of numbers is the largest area of the college. It is clear that there is a real demand for this flexible mode of delivery. Our students come from all walks of life and are spread right across the state. Many of our most successful students are adult learners. Open Learning has continued to provide a broad range of programs including TCE courses, pre-tertiary subjects and VETE programs.

Studying through Open Learning can be a real challenge. The nature of this mode of delivery requires students to work independently, be self-motivated, good at managing their time and meeting deadlines. One of our goals this year has been to help students in developing these skills and support them in their study program. Hence, there has been an emphasis on providing a Pastoral Care program for our students. All students are assigned to a Pastoral Care teacher who provides support and assists those students who are working through the Study Support Materials. There has been a lot of positive feedback so far about our work in this area. Our aim is to ensure that as many students as possible complete their courses at the end of the year and have successful outcomes in Open Learning.

Open Learning now has a database that allows all records to be stored on-line and gives ready access to information. A priority this year has been providing a professional development program and resources to assist staff in using the database. All teachers now have a working knowledge of the program and in 2003 this will become our main means of recording information and tracking what we do in OL.

In 2002 we have looked closely at the OL program. This has included gathering information from staff and surveying a large cross-section of our students, enabling us to find out what we do well and how we can improve and better meet the needs of our students in terms of the programs we offer and the service we provide. Thank you to those who assisted in this process. We will continue to build on this feedback. In particular, this will include the development of courses to suit a broader range of students' needs and interests.

A special thankyou to all staff who have worked in Open Learning this year, particularly Trudy Lister (Pastoral Care Program Manager) and Chris Berry (Admin Program Manager) who have made a huge contribution to the management of this area.

To our many students, we hope you have had great success in OL this year.

VET HOSPITALITY

Functions, preparing and serving meals, mixing cocktails and mocktails, making espressos, OH&S, First Aid, Responsible Service of Alcohol, fire fighting, long hours, late nights, stress, mopping floors and washing up. That's what we signed up for and that's what we got.

There are eighteen students in the 2002 VET Hospitality class, comprising of eleven back of house (kitchen) and the seven front of house staff (restaurant preparation and service). To enter this class we went through a thorough screening process involving applications for the program, interviews and prior knowledge of the industry, to extract the elite, talented people for the limited positions in the program. The aim of the program is to give us hands-on experience in the industry while training us in all of the issues involved in our beloved professions. To obtain our Certificate 2 in Hospitality Operations we had to obtain a level of acceptable competency in the modules of occupational health and safety, working in a socially diverse environment, food hygiene, working with colleagues and customers. We were required to update our industry knowledge, in addition to the specific commercial cookery or food and beverage service modules.

During the year we are required to do work placements outside of the College in various establishments, some of which included the Country Club Casino, International Hotel, Launceston General Hospital, Hallam's, Victoria's, and many others. We also arrange our own functions here at Elcies Restaurant, where we provide for family, friends or outside organizations who've hired our services for the evening or lunch period. This involves selecting a theme for the event, menus and costing of the recipes, 'prep work' before the event, setting up the restaurant with polished cutlery, glassware, napkins, flowers and so on (just like a real restaurant!).

Some of the highlights for the year have been the theme restaurants (they are something rather special), the work placements, the cut fingers, broken glasses and plates and the forming of contacts with potential employers and friendships with each other. Through the highs and the lows of the year we have experienced many, many new challenges and I know for a fact, if we could go back and do it all again none of us would do any different.


















DANCE

CERTIFICATE 2 IN TOURISM

The anticipated growth in the tourism industry in Tasmania with the arrival of the two Spirit of Tasmania vessels this year ensures that this program will lead to viable job opportunities. Many students who undertake study in this subject intend to further their qualifications at Drysdale or enrol at the University of Tasmania in a Bachelor of Tourism.

Students completed five core units and select six elective units in order to make up their certificate. The students complete off-the-job assignments in class and then apply their theoretical knowledge in the workplace. Each student completes four workplacements throughout the year. These workplaces may be as varied as the Qantas Lounge at the airport, or a boutique hotel such as The Old Bakery Inn. The workplace supervisor assesses each student while they are on placement.

The students complete the theory component of the module 'Operate an Automated Information System' in College before accessing the Galileo reservations system at Drysdale. This partnership which we have with Drysdale Institute of TAFE allows the students to meet the staff and become familiar with the facilities and courses that TAFE offers.

The Country Club Casino has a member of staff on the management committee for this program; they also support the program with the offer of workplacements. Sandra Brown, from staff training at the Casino, runs workshops for the VET Tourism students on Responsible Serving of Alcohol; this module allows the students to gain employment in bars and restaurants.


The integration of on-the-job and off-the-job training allows the students to gain experience and confidence in many areas of the tourism industry. Past students have travelled overseas to gain additional language skills before returning to Tasmania to commence further study or employment in the industry.

In 2001 this program was awarded a National Tourism Training award. The success of Certificate 2 Tourism Operations lies in part with the many and varied work places and their supervisors who contribute their time and expertise to help the next generation of tourism personnel gain an insight into this exciting and dynamic industry.

LIFESTYLE & FASHION



The band sounded great, and the songs were ones we all knew.













VET PHOTOGRAPHIC SERVICES

- The addiction of the Advanced Music class to chocolate and the disappearance of Pete's jelly beans.




















ENGLISH PAIRS







Students have the opportunity to further extend their recreational experiences in Stage 5 where they will be able to develop greater leadership qualities.


















