

### AVIATION STUDIES

This year's aviation studies class consisted of 4 females and 8 males. Each with their own reasons for undertaking the course, from gaining a Pilot's licence as soon as possible to having a general interest in aviation. The course consists of the theory needed to undertake the Basic Aeronautical Knowledge test, which is a requirement of the Civil Aviation Safety Authority to achieve a pilot's licence. Topics covered include aerodynamics, engines and their associated systems, instruments, navigation, basic meteorology, air law and human factors.

The course is interspersed with videos on aeronautical topics such as modern and historical aircraft, air crash investigations, history and theory of flight, all of which are aimed at making the course material more real. In addition the Internet is used when required to access aviation information, such as weather forecasts.

The highlight of the year for the students was a flight to Georgetown Airport in Cessna 172s piloted by 2 staff members where the students were given information on Sport Aviation (formerly Ultralights) by John Morley the Acting CFI. Prior to take off the students carried out weight and balance calculations on "their" aircraft and participated in the mandatory pre-flight inspection walk around. Once in the aircraft acting as co-pilot reading out the pre takeoff checklist. We were fortunate to have perfect flying weather with only one student taking out a "sick bag", purely as a precaution. The students will undertake their BAK examination and when they pass can take the next step, which may not happen for a number of years. Nonetheless they have begun the journey towards the achievement of becoming a flyer.



# Aboriginal

One of the highlights of the Aboriginal Club year was the trip for Indigenous Arts and Cultural Development, at the Victorian College of the Arts, in July. Six college students, Patrick, Fish, Keisha, Tasman, Kailah and Sam, accompanied by high school dancer Harley, all interested in the Arts, enjoyed three stimulating days in Melbourne. it is doubtful they will ever forget Circus Oz.

The students returned interested in pursuing further studies in chosen fields, such as Performance and Visual Art. Some wore the give away caps we'd received, tagged *Indigenous Education Branch*. This tag prompted a response from one of our boys who is interested in song writing and had spent the trip noting words and phrases that took his fancy is his note book.

"Indigenous", he said, and went on to comment on how hard it is to be recognised by the general population if you are not dark skinned, which he isn't. "Education", he continued, explaining that it isn't him, by which he meant he has spent some time away from formal education. Then his writer's eyes lit up and he said "Branch", Now there's a good word. Branch of a tree, branch out...so many meanings.

This snippet illustrates the issues we deal with each year in the Aboriginal Club. One of our aims is to educate the broader community on what being Aboriginal means. We endeavour to show that it is about continuing, evolving culture and community connection, not skin colour. Another of our aims is to reengage and support young Aboriginal people in educational courses. Many have slipped through the system due to life difficulties, some of which are recorded by our young writers.

Another highlight of our year was the launch, by acclaimed Aboriginal writer, Jim Everett, of **Chain**, an anthology of artwork and writing from 2002-3 Aboriginal students. Our major literary project this year has been the compilation of a book of poetry by Shadow, an Open Learning student who has spent some time in prison, the publication of which was funded by Aboriginal Education.

We are proud of our young ones and how they branch out into the community but do not forget us. They plan to make a difference in the world, from Allison who is studying Law in Sydney through to KC who has been approached to provide text for a City Park creative project and Michelle who has gained a traineeship in the Office of Aboriginal Affairs.

Amid identity issues and challenges created in community (as a result of injustices sadly perpetrated throughout Australia's history) there is always the creative people and the hope. Not to mention the talent!


The Motorsport program was officially launched in early July with coverage in the Examiner newspaper. The car arrived from Melbourne at this time, was immediately dismantled from its rolling chassis state and preparation of components began for its reconstruction. Over the following weeks we were engaged in various activities to rebuild the car, for example; polishing the aluminum bodywork, preparing other body panels for painting, servicing all mechanical components and locating the wiring loom in the car. This has presented its own set of problems with us having to overcome a number of issues whilst building the car. It definitely turned out to be more than sliding Tab A into Slot B!!!! Although these issues were a nuisance, valuable learning experiences were achieved.


The course has required us to look at many aspects of business such as record keeping for costing purposes, the influence of major events on tourism and the economy of our state. 


### MATHEMATICS



Students who have not succeeded with traditional; methods of problem-solving are often stimulated by computer programs. Our teachers are endeavouring to break new ground in employing alternative strategies to make mathematics applicable and rewarding. All students thrive on success however small the steps!



Maths Applied 3/4 students are more competent than they are often portrayed, particularly by themselves. Many of these students enrol in this subject to gain background knowledge and understanding to prepare them for Maths Applied 5, the pre-tertiary applied subject. They aim to apply maths in business, finance and commerce (for example).

Mathematics teachers are placing a total commitment on the acquisition and/or production of alternative delivery modes. Applied 3/4 students thrive on team approaches, they work better in groups than they do as individuals. Theses students are in the transition from highly dependent learners in mathematics to semi-independent learners. The key ingredient they need to acquire is success, which breads confidence. It's a slow process, not to be rushed.





- Information sessions for several Australian universities


Integration and interaction have been very visible during the year. Cooperation and sharing between our international students and our local students have resulted in exciting outcomes.

The International Student Team was led by the Assistant Principal, Deaine Coyle, and Phyllis Robinson the Program Manager.
















#### JAPANESE

Half of the group comprised French students and teachers from LC. The other half included students and teachers from Launceston Church Grammar School, a French teacher from Newstead College, an ex-student of LC now studying French at UTAS and her family from \Scottsdale.

We were based in a lovely hotel across from the beach. Our itinerary included excursions to the Aquarium, Ile Amedee with its beautiful historic lighthouse, Le Parc Forestier, the Tjibaou Cultural Centre and the daily Market. We took a delightful city tour aboard Le Petit Train, noting the sights and the stunning mountain scenery. Of course there was plenty of time for swimming, sunbathing and shopping.

The Amedee Island Excursion, complete with snorkelling in the gorgeous lagoon, sumptuous buffet

lunch, island entertainment and coconut and pareo demonstrations, was an unforgettable highlight of our trip.

Highlights for the year have included our Writers Competition and visits from performing artists, Moses Aaron and Geoff Goodfellow.



The creative achievements of our students are extremely important and must continually be supported as a valuable aspect in the holistic development of our students.





#### Computer Graphics and Design

Dimensional Computer Graphics and Animation are now so much a part of every day life that most people ither take them for granted or assume that the images they are seeing are "real".

computer Graphics and Design students at Launceston College use a selection of "Industry Standard" 3D omputer modeling and Animation software including "AutoCAD" and "3D Studio Max". These programs are sed extensively in Film and Television to produce a range of objects and special effects which would either be oo costly or physically impossible to produce in real life. The "trick" is to give these objects "Photorealism" hich means that they can merge with, or even replace reality without the appearance of being faked.

This year students began the year by working to a "brief" which required them to construct a 3 dimensional omputer model of a locomotive and then use that model in a short animated movie. While these "models" look

good as still images, when animated the results were incredible. Many had steam and smoke belching from the appropriate places and fancy camera movements which convey a very professional appearance. One student, Oliver Stannus, successfully experimented with a grainy sepia effect to give the impression that the animation was a very old cartoon movie. Other students have presented images from their Major Project which was undertaken during term two and the early part of term three. These projects are the outcome of design briefs set by the individual student and range from conventional architectural work to fairly "out there" science fiction.

The software now being used by students in Computer Graphics and Design allows students to let their imagination run wild. Given a good idea and a will to find a means of achieving it, anything is possible!

# MULTI CULTURAL DAY on the map measures about 200 kilometres 2004



Our role this year has been to develop and implement strategies that communicate effectively with the wider community.





#### A Music Student's Perspective – by Gretel Templeton



### DRAMA 2004.



# FOOTLOOSE.



















































### Media Production — Radio LCFM 87.8
