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

Principal's Report

The old Chinese curse, 'may you live in interesting times" comes to mind when I reflect on education across the country over the last year. The year 2006 certainly has been an interesting one, yet I hope that rather than a curse it is the beginning of a strong resurgence in the valuing of education and training, particularly in Tasmania.

Across the State and the country we have witnessed the political debate about curriculum, completion certificates, retention and assessment. We have witnessed the Federal Government advocating a national curriculum and in our State we have experienced significant attention on the Essential Learnings.

In spite of these external issues, the Launceston College tradition of remaining focused on students' needs has resulted in continuous improvement.

We are constantly aware of the physical environment and its need to be conducive to learning. This year we have witnessed the redevelopment of the College theatre as a result of an 'Investing in Schools' submission – this new facility is being used extensively across the learning areas.

During the year the new Photography Studio came into usage as did the extensive ICT computer section in the Launceston College Library. The latter being a significant addition to student research and study options.

Before the year ends the redevelopment of our Hospitality facility, including Elcie's Restaurant, will be underway, as will the completion of the student meeting area in the Undercroft.

The social and emotional environment has been extremely positive – a combination of formal student support programs, high level interaction across staff and students, extensive yet low level supervision complemented by a collaborative, mature student body. Launceston College is a college of rich racial diversity, one in which students interact more harmoniously than any other school in my experience.

You will notice in this *Churinga* the Global Gourmet Day, an annual event in which we share the culinary delights of our students' countries. The participation in this event involves students across the College as well as parents and the community and is characteristic of the respectful environment in which we are fortunate to work and learn.

This year too, our production of *Hair* included students from our international group. *Hair*, like *Grease* and Footloose before it, was an outstanding success. Each year well over 100 students perform to a total audience in excess of 6000 – the Launceston College Production is a major event on the local theatre calendar.

2006 also saw the initiative that is **Info Expo Day** for students, an event in which a multitude of service providers and community groups stage an Information Exposition for students. This year the Expo ranged from Electoral Commission to Police Force Recruitment and Union representation and was well attended by students.

Our Student Representative Council, though small in numbers, is large in heart and I congratulate this group for their significant contribution inclusive of involvement with the College Association and their work in facilitating College


This year our students continued to excel in all areas of their endeavours. In the Launceston Competitions our students excelled against all public and private colleges. Further, to name but a very small number of individual

I thank them all.

I will finish this overview with a challenge - in a State where in less than 6 years there will be more people leving the workforce than entering it, how can we, community and schools, ensure that each and every student that enters our colleges leaves with a qualification that enables them to contribute positively in our rapidly aging society?

It is a challenge we must address.

Aviation Studies





This year's Aviation Studies class consisted of 2 females and 8 males. Each with their own reasons for undertaking the course, from gaining a pilot's licence as soon as possible to having a general interest in aviation. The course consists of the theory needed to undertake the Basic Aeronautical Knowledge (BAK) test, which is a requirement of the Civil Aviation Safety Authority to achieve a pilot's licence. Topics covered included aerodynamics, engines and their associated systems, instruments, navigation, basic meteorology, air law and human factors. The course is interspersed with videos on aeronautical topics such as modern and historical aircraft, air crash investigations, history and theory of flight, all of which are aimed at making the course material more real. In addition the Internet is used when required to access aviation information, such as weather forecasts and CASA regulations.

The highlight of the year for the students was a flight to George Town Airport in Cessna 172s piloted by 2 staff members where the students were given information on Sport Aviation (formerly Ultralights) by Eugene Reid the Acting CFI. Prior to take off, the students carried out weight and balance calculations on 'their' aircraft and participated in the mandatory pre-flight inspection walk around. Once in the aircraft, acting as co-pilot, reading out the pre-takeoff checklist. The students undertook their BAK examination and once they pass they can take the next step, which may not happen for a number of years. Nonetheless they have begun the journey towards the achievement of becoming a flyer.



French

This year at LC, there have been 3 French classes: a Level 3 beginners, a Level 3 night class and a Level 5. The dedication and commitment of the level 5 students is remarkable. As well as regular tutorial attendance, students undertook extra-curricular weekly conversation classes in term 3 and 4 students chose to enter a statewide competition as extra exam preparation.

Students worked hard to cover the requirements of these demanding courses and made excellent progress but there was always time for music, fun and culturally-enriching activities. Students in the daytime beginners' class cooked *quiche* and *patisseries* for Global Gourmet Day and set up, decorated and served on the French stall. On Bastille Day in July, the 2 daytime classes enjoyed a visit to Le Fournil du Yorktown where *patisseries* and *chocolats chaudo* were appreciated. The evening class prepared a sumptuous buffet with a variety of French culinary treats.

We were all very pleased to host 2 French exchange students in term 2. Pierre-Gilles enrolled in the level 5 class and was a great help. Vianny joined us to celebrate *le quatorze juillet* and provided tuition one week in the night class with Pierre-Gilles.

The level 5 class has been fortunate to benefit from the experiences of Grace and Caitlin who spent their last summer holidays as exchange students in France. Grace has just returned from a holiday in Noumea and Rousin from Paris. Also, in July, we welcomed Sue, a German exchange student.

Japan Trip







The Land of the Rising Sun...

Nine students, one teacher, eleven days, one completely different country! Hardly anyone knew what to expect when the Launceston College Japanese group consisting of Angie Dicker, Keith Crawford, Rae-Lauree Burn, Rowena Price, Andrew Dicker, Lorelle Knowles, Brigitte Mitchell, Riccardo Tedeschi, Emma Harvey and myself touched down in Tokyo on September the 10th. For many it was our first time out of Australia. The first notable thing was the heat of 36 degrees bearing down upon us, the trip was a chance for a holiday, to get to know our class mates better and of course to use a language which we had been taught but never had the chance of really speaking, reading and writing out of the classroom.

We students were exposed to new sights and means of transport; from knowing the subway system inside and out to cruising along the countryside at several hundred kilometers an hour in a 'bullet train'... even bus and boat rides proved interesting. There were vending machines everywhere selling drinks, from Dr Pepper to beer. Streets would be packed during the day and a walk down a single street would reveal at least three McDonalds stores. The traditional meals were amazing, you would wake up after sleeping on the floor with your head on a pillow filled with rice husks and enjoy a meal of rice, pickled vegetables, bean curd soup, fruit, cabbage, Japanese style omelette and some form of meat; each arranged delicately in small servings.

Most of the Japanese people were polite towards us and always seemed willing to help out foreigners. Many signs and directories were in English, helping us when translating became difficult; and at many times, the translations made no sense at all as they were poorly written. Out of the many sights visited, we students were exposed to some of the old Japan, e.g. temples and shrines; one such being the Kinkakuji, which is a pavilion made out of gold. The ecosystem was extraordinary; there was plenty of plant life in peaceful surroundings, contributing to the serenity of the places for meditation.



As well there was the modern Japan including the Tokyo anime centre (which was closed the day we visited there). It was clear how important animation was to their culture, it has basically become a religion, with stores dedicated to selling comics and fan merchandise. Visiting Hiroshima was an unnerving experience as we visited the exact place, where 61 years ago the first atomic bomb was used. The peace park erected as a site of remembrance is breathtaking, complete with statues, depicting atrocities as a result of the destruction and the last surviving building; it was amazing to see a building which had survived such a horrific explosion. Everyone was brave enough to enter the museum which went into detail about the bombing and how we are still under the threat of nuclear holocaust. I believe that what was seen in there affected everyone ... its purpose is to prevent such a catastrophe from ever happening again.

Japanese culture a long time ago revolved around 'the way of the warrior', it was clear as samurai swords were available to buy everywhere; they would have made great souvenirs ... if it wasn't for customs of course! Other sites that were visited were the giant Buddha, known to be the world's biggest wooden structure and Himeiji castle which was complete with battlements and old weapons; it was hard to imagine taking it with an invading army as it was built with all kinds of defenses, from steep tracks to murder holes for arrows and rifles.

Shopping was major as there were stores everywhere and some students managed to hire bikes to ease the weary legs and get around faster. Being from a place where crime is normal, we ensured that our bikes were secured as well as possible, but many Japanese would often leave theirs out in the open, where they weren't going to be taken!

This was the first Launceston College group to partake in such a journey, surviving nine hour plane rides and wild traffic. I would personally like to thank Angie Dicker on behalf of the group for working so hard to make the trip possible as it was well worth it, each student came back feeling like a different person as there was so much for us to take in. I highly recommend it for anyone interested in language to study it now while you are here at college ... because you don't know where it might lead.






Science

Andrew's result was in the top 1% of results from all participants throughout Australia.




« Introduction to Life Science




Titration Competition

After a lapse of several years, Launceston College again had teams competing in the Titration Competition run by the Royal Australian Chemical Institute. The Competition gives students a chance to demonstrate both their practical laboratory skills and their scientific understanding; each student must have knowledge of the reactions taking place and the relevant chemical equations, be dexterous and able to manipulate the glassware and finally be able to complete some standard calculations (a calculator is handy for this!).

In the end there were two teams representing Launceston College. They spent the morning of Saturday 12 August busy in a Chemistry Laboratory at the University of Tasmania, Newnham, along with teams from other local schools. The Competition also took place in Hobart and on the North West Coast, meaning the LC teams were competing not so much against the other teams present on the day, but against all other Senior Secondary teams around the State.

Our participants are to be commended for their motivation and initiative, fitting in practice sessions around exams and other commitments and giving up their Saturday morning to compete. Special mention should go to Dara Mullins and Abby Gray who both received Certificates of Achievement. Their results were within 1% of the true value. Great effort guys!







Guest Speakers

Students were able to hear visiting lecturers during 2006 giving them an idea of real science being completed in the community.

In August as part of Science Week, Dr Troy Gaston from the Maritime College addressed Environmental and Biology students on The Impact of Rice Grass on the Tamar Estuary.

On Wednesday 27-September Launceston College was fortunate to host the Australian Institute of Physics "Women in Physics Lecture". This lecture was delivered by Professor Deb Kane of Macquarie University, NSW. Professor Kane spoke to students from Launceston College, Prospect High School and Newstead College on her research work about using lasers to clean extremely small particles (nano-particles) from the surface of materials. It was fascinating for students to learn that Australia is leading the world in this area of research and that the technology was particularly useful in the production of micro-chips and in the cleaning of surfaces of art work that has deteriorated over the centuries.

I have been attending J block for a number of years myself and I have learnt a lot and come a long way with the help that everyone that comes in here is very kindly willing to give.



Police in Schools







Computing






National Numeracy Week







Thailand & Vietnam Exchange





The concept for this exchange occurred during a conversation between College staff member Steve Tully and the director of the annual Thai Exchange Supannachaht Plang-ngoen (Chaht) during the 2005 High School Exchange Program. Chaht expressed interest in the proposal that the exchange be extended to include Launceston College in 2006. This proposal was ratified in a meeting between the Director of Sa-nguan Ying School, Supanburi and Keith Wenn, Principal of Launceston College. In January of this year Steve Tully and his family visited the school in Supanburi for eight days in order to develop the program with Chaht and to meet the families of the nominated students who were coming to Launceston College.

Four students made a commitment to the program: Brianna Cain; Nick McElwee, Lachlan Ingram and Natalie Szabo. These students and their families hosted students from Thailand from 18 March until the 14 April and Steve Tully hosted Chaht for the same duration. The Thai students – Kanchanok Suttirat, Uracha Theeranon, Naphat Umalee and Nubathong Jirapruethisiri were quickly whisked off to their host family homes to re-meet as a group on Monday morning. Our Thai students all decided to do the same subjects: x2 lines of English as a Second Language, Photography and Catering. For the next four weeks our students and their billets spent an incredible time together, building life-long friendships and exchanging everything from language to recipes. When it came time to see the students off at the airport we had to freight in extra supplies of tissues to deal with deluge of tears!

Just prior to departing for Thailand, Keith Wenn asked whether it would be possible to develop an exchange between our new sister school in Hanoi. It was determined that the best solution was to fly to Hanoi after the Thai exchange was completed and Deaine Coyle (Assistant Principal, International Student Program) became part of the team. Finally the group flew out of Launceston on 30 August staying for two nights in Singapore before landing in Thailand. The reception at Bangkok Airport was overwhelming! Our students and the Thai students were so excited to see each other again. We proceeded by bus to Supanburi and were welcomed at a huge reception at the school. For the next two weeks, along with students from Riverside High, Brooks High, Port Dalrymple, Queechy High and Kingston High we were taken on a very demanding helter-skelter tour of Thailand. Many of the students (and some staff) found the heat difficult to deal with and the food not always to their liking. The College students and staff revelled in the heat and there is photographic evidence that Steve Tully gained more than a couple of kilos! Deaine on the other hand lost weight and was very proud of her tan! The exchange is highly valued by the Thais and we even featured in an extensive documentary on Thai Channel 11 which was broadcast nationally!


On Friday the 15th of September we arrived at Bangkok airport and split from our friends from the other Tasmanian schools. Late that night we landed at Hanoi International Airport to be warmly greeted by the host families. The next morning we were welcomed by Hanoi Amsterdam School and conducted on a brief tour of the school – the students in Vietnam attend school on Saturdays – and then visited the original Hanoi University. On Sunday we travelled by minibus to HaLong Bay for a cruise, which was wonderful! On Monday we re-attended school, visited a local pottery village and then were entertained by students from HA School and LC in an impromptu concert where Natalie stole the show by demonstrating her dancing skills.










Careers Centre


In 2006, we have welcomed students from South Korea, Thailand, Japan, France, Malaysia, China, the United States and Sweden.











A great time was had by all, and the dancing was fantastic!


























Business Studies







Student Support Services and the Public Relations students brought a new event to Launceston College – the Info Expo - 'What's My Future Like?' on Thursday 5th October.




About twenty service providers from the Launceston community came to the College Hall, providing a range of resources and opportunities for students to link up,









Students have examined the built environment and investigated issues such as:














LCFM 87.8

The visit this year by Lano & Woodley has given the students their first opportunity to put to air


