This is then a college with significant history – one that has contributed substantially to the educational culture of Launceston and the north of Tasmania.


Over just the last 10 years, approximately 1/10 of this site's educational history, over 5000 students have completed their year 12 to be part of our communities and communities around the state, nation and the world.

Launceston College is arguably a major organisation in the educational network of Tasmania and Northern Tasmania.

There would be few gatherings in this city that do not have alumni of Launceston College present – and those gatherings could be across the spectrum of community and business life because graduates from Launceston College have had access to diverse and rich curriculum offerings.

The capacity for students of Launceston College to pursue their professional/employment dreams and at the same time undertake study in areas of interest such as Music, Drama or Hospitality is a strength of this college and one that I know is valued highly by students.

In a time of change, as well as looking forward we should also look back and focus on the learning organisation elements that have stood a test of time. We need to identify those elements from the past that have resulted in significant student achievement and development – and ensure they are part of the new organisation's repertoire.



A restructure of Tasmanian Colleges and TAFE has opportunities for students and in a rapidly changing world we need to ensure those opportunities are accessible. Of particular importance is the development of a seamless transition through VET Certification and indeed to diploma.

We know however that emotionally and physically safe learning environments are critical for student success. We also know that for students to gain the optimum from their post high school learning they require a connection to the organisation - and this is heavily reliant on the student centered support offered our young adults by Launceston College staff.

Over recent years this level of support for students has developed significantly with enhanced academic programs, ongoing tutorials and a constant ramping up of the pastoral care and support program. Campus development ensuring that the physical environment is conducive to students' organisational connectedness has also been a focus for Launceston College.

In this respect next year our Television studio comes on line and we intend to progress further with the plans for the College Auditorium, further adding to the extensive facilities that make this college a college of opportunity for students.

Launceston College is constantly preparing for the future, but with an awareness of the responsibilities of our tradition.

















# CHILDRENS SERVICES | LIFESTYLE & FASHION/ FASHION FOR FUN

## **VET Certificate II in COMMUNITY SERVICES - Children's Services**

This year 16 students have combined study in college with going to work as child carers once a week. Term I found students in Child Care Centres such as Pilgrim, Stewart Services, Pedder Patter, MRC, Lilea Pad, Exeter, Toddle Inn, Cressy, TACCA, Newstead and 3 ABC centres. They learned about OHS issues, confidentiality and other policies. They learned about children's behaviour and ran play experiences and, although a couple decided child care work may not be the right path for them to follow, most were very successful and made great impressions on their supervisors. Some days started at 7am and finished at 2pm, some from 1pm to 6pm, others were 9am to 4pm.

Term 2 found most students working in Family Day Carers private homes from Cressy to Legana to Georgetown. They experienced going to Kids Paradise and McDonalds with a tribe of kids, ran activities with little groups and helped feed and put children to bed. A few students who are thinking of a University Degree in teaching were allowed to work in an Infant School. In all placements students are treated as a member of the staff team and are expected to be responsible and reliable. One student was offered paid holiday work and a couple of students are hoping to apply for traineeships.

In the classroom in J Block we had fun in play workshops and discussions and students often managed to wangle time to do their assignments in class.

It was great to have students volunteer to work at the Cancer Relay, St Giles Craft Fair, Kite Festival, Playgroup Week, the Teddy Bear Picnic and Year 11 Orientation Days.


It is a varied program and although VET students do have to work hard both on and off the job and be really very well organised they seem to grow in self confidence and maturity and be so much better prepared for planning their future careers. 2008/9 should see at least 10 of these girls at TAFE and maybe 2 at Uni.

It is great to have a committed small group of students at this level of teaching and it is always sad to see them leave at the end of a year but it is so rewarding to visit child care centres and see so many of 'my' students working in them.




## Lifestyle and Fashion/Fashion for Fun

My office is situated just inside the entrance to C Block Level 2, the main designated English area; each day has a passing parade of some of the more than six hundred students who study English and ESL at LC. Most come to work, some make it their off-line meeting place, others like to access one of the many computers located strategically around the block. I often ponder exactly why each individual is studying a particular course, what their aspirations are and, of course, whether we are meeting their expectations! If we don't, then it won't be from lack of trying; I am fortunate to work with a group of colleagues who are very much a team, and who strive to ensure the best outcomes for each of their students.

On these pages you will see just a few examples of work done by some of these six hundred students. However, the Level 5 English Communications course teaches us to look at the "silences" in texts - not just what is in a text, but also what the text creator has left out - and this text is no exception. Firstly, of course, space doesn't permit us to include all that we could; secondly, technology means that work in this area can now also be in the form of a web site, a Power Point presentation or video. Suffice it to say, that we see a variety of excellent work. Not only that, but we see significant individual progress at many levels: writing skills mature, confidence in speaking is developed, a creative talent revealed, practical applications of the subject begin to make sense, the capacity to participate in the community is enhanced. Rewards manifest themselves in a variety of ways - for our students and for us.


Sharyn Lawrence organised a highly successful writing competition for Year 10 students.


Gino's other heroes are his parents as they came to Australia to build a life for the Frantangelo family.


Gino's advice to all the newly aspiring

sports people is to; "enjoy the journey, the end result isn't as important as the effort that goes into the journey. Overcome your obstacles and you overcome yourself".



One of these tasks was fund raising to cover the costs of the events Launceston College students raised an amazing \$504 to date, way above the other teams Our team consists of around ten people.






## **National Numeracy Week**


# TERING DANCE
















Constable Steve Bauld returned to the college for his second year as our police officer in his role in the 'Police in Schools Program'.





# ROAD SAFETY WEEK


In addition to studying Australia's legal and political system, Legal Studies students also visited the courts observing criminal trials and watching the wheels of justice slowly turn.

## **Active After School Program**





# **TASRAD** Course and Rostering/Competitions























# COMPUTER GRAPHICS COMPUTER GRAPHICS & DESIGN & DESIGN







Computer Graphics and Design focuses on the development of student's ability to present solutions to design challenges using a variety of 3 dimensional modelling and animation software. Computer Graphics students have very recently gained access to the latest version of 3D Studio Max. This software has been used extensively in animated "Hollywood" movies such as "Shrek", and "The Incredibles", as well as for special effects in the more recent James Bond movies, the Harry Potter series, and Jurassic Park.

Luckily as a school, Launceston College and its students can purchase this software for around \$200 per licence. The normal commercial price is over \$7,000.

This software has the ability to "seamlessly" merge students 3D computer "models" with "real life" scenes.

Early in term one, students were given a design brief which required them to construct a 3 dimensional scene based on a domestic kitchen or a public building foyer. This involved creating individual computer "models" that were then imported into a 3 dimensional space that was constructed using the same software. These scenes could then have a "camera" pass through them so as to create a short 3 dimensional movie. The objective was to create the illusion that the movie was in fact recorded in a real room. While the camera was passing through the room, individual elements could be doing realistic things such as a pot on the stove emitting steam, toast popping out of the toaster, goldfish swimming in an aquarium and so on.

Another task that students were required to do in term one was to create a 3D computer model of an object and place it into a digital photograph so as to make it look as if it were part of the original photo. Callum Collins has done a particularly good job of creating his version of the Mitsubishi "Evo", and placing it onto an image of a runway. Callum is obviously a big "Top Gear" fan.


















