


Lifestyle and Fashion students have had a busy year completing the 5 set design briefs.


Students started the year by making fabric covers for their journals which reflected their personalities.

VET Child Care is a Success at LC in 2009

This year at Launceston College we have worked hard in both of the two child care training programs from the new Training Package, CHC202, released in January 2009.

We had 27 students enrol in the Year 11 program, Certificate II in Community Services (Child Care) plus TCE syllabus Working with Children and in the Year 12 program, Certificate III in Children's Services.

They have been training in 25 different child care centres and 15 different family day care homes. What a celebration the year has been for us all!

Many Certificate III students are now employed as casual, relief or part time staff in child care centres such as Children's Playhouse, Stewart Services, Pilgrim and Lady Gowrie. Some of these students will continue their training in the Diploma while on the job next year.

Most students in the Certificate II program will continue on to complete Certificate III at Launceston College in 2010. Some will complete Year 12 in University entrance studies for teaching or nursing.







Athletics

2008 School Knockout Athletics

Launceston College excelled in the Schools Knockout Athletics competition at the end of 2008. A boys team qualified for the "cup" final which meant they were the top team in the state and the girls team qualified for the "plate" final which means they were second. Competition at Olympic Park Melbourne was against all other state teams who had also qualified. We went with high expectations as we had some very high standard athletes who compete at a national level.

Success at the Knockout occurs because of good teamwork and having depth in your talent pool. We had a team of athletes committed to working for and with each other to achieve success. Congratulations to the teams, not only on their athletic success but the way they represented the College and themselves in such a mature and responsible way.




Triple P - Road Safety Project

In July, we launched the Triple P road safety project at Launceston College, with students, sponsors and official guests gathering for a morning tea. 82 P-Plate drivers signed up, hoping to be the winners of the monthly draws

of \$50.00 worth of free petrol for drivers who had not lost any demerit points, and in the running for the major draws at the end of the project.

While the evidence shows that young drivers are over-represented in serious and fatal crashes, it has been fantastic to see the enthusiasm for, and commitment to, safe driving amongst so many of our students here at College. Most young drivers want



to be safe, and their driving behaviours reflect this. Sadly, lack of experience and judgment, coupled with risk-taking, sometimes results in tragedy. By providing extra resources, focus and support, we hoped to improve the chances of young drivers staying safe on the roads.

2009 will go down in history as a year when beginning drivers got heaps of practice driving in wet and slippery conditions... Of our 82 participants, the split between male and female was exactly 50/50, (what are the chances of that?), with 34% of the total being rural students. The organisers have been very pleased with the sign-up numbers and continuing commitment shown by the students.

Thermo-Chemistry @ Utas



Year 12 Students Experience University Chemistry

Dr Andrew Seen from the UTas Launceston campus Chemistry Department kindly offered a Thermo-chemistry experience to our LC Chemistry students. The experiment involved the chemistry of the coordination complexes of Nickel.

To make it fit in with the grade 12 syllabus, the experiment was adjusted to use the language our students are expected to be familiar with: bond energy, breaking bonds is endothermic, making bonds is exothermic, naming of organic compounds (diaminohexane).








This year as a technical exercise students were shown how spectrographs are made and how to interpret the resulting graph; this graph is shown below and shows that the optimum ratio between nickel cations and diaminohexane is 1:3 as measured by the amount of light energy absorbed in the purple and red colours.

"We made heaps of meals together as a class – Breakfast, Morning and Afternoon Teas and Lunches"






The most important skill we developed was that of team work.

Formula One in Schools Challenge

Three teams from Launceston College participated in the State Final of the Formula One in Schools Challenge that was held at the Tailrace Centre on Wednesday October 7.

A total of 28 teams participated in the FI Challenge that involved designing a scale model FI racing car using quite complex "CATIA" computer aided design software. This is the same software that Airbus and Boeing are using to design the next generation of airliners. CATIA is also used by a number of vehicle manufacturers, such as Toyota, as the principal design software for new car designs. This very expensive software is made available to schools at an affordable price through a special arrangement between the Re-Engineering Australia Foundation and the French company Dassault Systemes.

Students involved in the FI Challenge formed teams of 4 or 5 people and after designing their cars, forwarded the design data to Brooks High School where a numerically controlled overhead router is used to convert the design data into the basic shape of the car body using a balsa wood block as the main material. The machined body is then hand finished with pre-made wheels, axles and other components fitted.

Concurrent with the above design and manufacturing aspects of the challenge, teams are required to establish mentoring relationships with a range of community participants, this has typically included engineering companies, politicians and people from a wide range of business backgrounds.

Students also have to produce a professional standard Design Folio, create a corporate image for their team through designing and contracting team uniforms and through the production of graphic design materials such as business cards, posters and leaflets.

On the day of the state finals, the cars which are powered by a single use CO_2 cylinder, are raced down a purpose built track with speeds measured by timing equipment that is accurate to .001 of a second. Teams are also judged on folio presentation, trade booth presentation, engineering standards, and a team verbal presentation.

The three teams from Launceston College achieved very high rankings on the overall judging. At the time of going to press, the final placings were unavailable however it is believed that at least two of the LC teams gained an overall score that placed them in the top 5 in the "Senior Professional" class. The overall Senior Professional class was won for a third year by Brooks High School.

Teams represented were the Carbon Compression Racing Team with Tim Plail, Owen Clifford, Brodie Geeves, Joel McBride, Nick Gimpl and Andrew Morris.





International Student Program




French


as part of her gap year.

One word describes this year for Contemporary Music and Audio Design: Massive!!


First up was Music in the Park. We had students entertain the public of Launceston on Sunday afternoons.

We had a large number of students performing at events and gigs throughout Tasmania and even in Melbourne this year.





Behavioural Studies



Students saw the Maths rooms re-painted at the start of 2009 and some of you used the new Classpad calculators that actually perform the algebra for you!









Chemistry has had the Chemistry Quiz Competition. Pracha won a plaque and certificates were won.




















One of LC's best known retired teachers and long-term advocate, Douglas Ewington died suddenly on February 5 this year.

Douglas was born in Queenstown in 1945; as a young person he began his life-long association with the Scouting movement. He completed his Science degree and B. Ed at the University of Tasmania. He became Senior Master of Geology at Launceston Matric in 1971, having taught at a number of high schools in the state. At the time, there were up to 9 classes of Geology at College - the fourth most popular subject after English, Maths and Biology. Over his many years at College Douglas taught Geology, Biology, and Environmental Studies. His rock specimen collection was legendary.

Douglas had many administrative and senior teaching roles at the College, and was well known for his passion, common-sense approach and attention to detail. Among numerous activities and interests over many years of involvement at LC, notably, he was instrumental to the development of B Block, encouraged students to enter the Duke of Edinburgh Award Scheme, as well as being a great supporter of the Library.

Douglas contributed many articles to the parent newsletter about the history of the College, and College Association matters. He was on the executive committee of the College Council from its inception in 1985 and became Chair of the later College Association in 2004. He and others fought tirelessly for the future of the College during the Tasmania Tomorrow changes. Shortly before he died he saw

the new 'Ewington Room', a classroom restored to its original décor, set up for meetings and named in his

Douglas worked tirelessly for several community organisations, notably the Scouting movement for over 40 years, including some years as Commissioner. The Queen Victoria Museum appreciated his assistance in matters to do with geology and biology. He is well-remembered for his letters to the Examiner about geological issues, especially to do with the condition of the Tamar River.

At his retirement in 1999 one of his colleagues, Dr Tony McCormack said:

'Douglas was relentless in his pursuit of excellence. Students and teachers at LC benefited greatly because of his hard work and persistence. Well organised and totally prepared, Douglas had the respect of his students, especially his Geology protégés. His passion for teaching will be very hard to repeat. His promotion of Launceston College is likely to continue for many years to come'.

Staff and students of Launceston College will benefit for many years from Douglas's tireless efforts on behalf of educational excellence and this College in particular.



On June 18 our Administrative Manager, Robin Jessup, died suddenly at home.

He spent only a relatively short time at Launceston College, having received an urgent request from us to take up the role from his much deserved retirement, however that time is not reflective of the impact of his contribution. His time at Launceston College was one of significant action and facility improvement and development.

Robin held the view that the quality of facilities and amenity of the campus impacted directly on the performance of students and staff, and seriously undertook to be part of providing the best environment for all of us here at College.

Prior to arriving at Launceston College, Robin had held numerous high level administration roles in the Public Service for over 40 years, and was held in high esteem by all his colleagues, past and present.

Robin was a man of great humour and compassion for the feelings of others. He is sadly missed.
