That tradition of ensuring student's aspirations are met, continues to drive this college, with programs and facilities constantly being developed.


As a result Launceston College had in excess of 1400 students involved in our programs this year, a very significant validation of Launceston College's direction, the expertise of staff and the commitment of the Launceston College Association. The large number of students also highlights the responsibility that LC has to ensure it continues to provide the northern community with a college that reflects tradition, vision and excellence in all that it does.

LC in 2010 continues to raise the bar in provision of student facilities with arguably the best campus in the state. 
Many students have elected to attend the Cafe course throughout the year and this has led to employment opportunities for them within the local community.

customers' needs. I can recommend the course to anyone who loves coffee and wishes to learn about hospitality.




Adam Barnett: This year I have attended two Cafe classes and I have really enjoyed the experience. I am

We watched episodes of various series, ranging from humorous to scary, modern to traditional, gentle to "trippy".


Some included: Desert Punk, Samurai Champloo, Rurouni Kenshin, Chobits, Moon Phase, Kino's Journey and DN-Angel.














The class of 2010 students has been committed to achieving nationally recognised hospitality qualifications by participating in a wide range of training activities in both on and off the job environments.




Seven students have left the course during the year as a result of employment in the hospitality industry – five of whom gained full time traineeships or apprenticeships. Great outcomes for these students!

Working with Children


This year three classes studied Working with Children and participated in running the College Playgroup as part of their course. This allowed the students to work with babies and children up to 5 years old.

Other prestigious wins were the Sue Cathcart Memorial Youth Jazz Award – Andrew Deavin (1st place), Lydia Bissett (2nd place); Youth in Blues Award 16 and Under 19 – Andrew Deavin.

Launceston College students featured in the Tasmanian Symphony Orchestra's **Student Composition Competition.** Students were required

to compose a piece for string quartet inspired by animals. Four students from Launceston College entered the competition and completed works of high calibre. Laura Sykes, Melissa Goodger, Andrew Deavin and Myles Flood were able to produce creative works entitled 'Yolla", 'The Valley of Calling', 'The Legend of Tabmow' and 'Felis Silvestris Catus'. Works by Melissa Goodger and Andrew Deavin were highly commended and selected as finalists.

These works and another by Callum Tully (*Mellow Strings*) were regarded as complex and student musicians were having difficulty in learning to perform these works. Conservatorium staff, led by the head of String Chamber Music Jeremy Williams, came to the rescue offering to record the students' works. The composers were astounded and exhuberant at listening to their works being performed and interpreted so masterfully and musically within a two hour period. Jeremy Williams along with the other chamber players, congratulated the students on composing such substantial works and commented that the standard of works was equal to those produced by Conservatorium composition students. These compositions along with other works were featured at the College's annual *Young Composers Concert* held at Launceston College's Music Department (E block) on Friday October 22^{nd.}



On July 21st the 'Friends for the Grand Piano' recital was held in the music area featuring pianists Catherine Binns, Bronti Cooke, Melissa Goodger, Andrew Deavin, clarinettist Laura Quigley and drummer, Callum Tully. Special guest pianist was Ben Austin who was visiting form Griffith Conservatorium. The recital was to honour all those families and individuals who 'bought' keynotes during the fundraising period for the College Grand Piano. A beautiful Huon pine and Blackwood plaque designed and made by past student, Nick Hill, was presented to the College with the names of all who 'own' a note engraved upon it. The plaque now hangs by the grand piano in E block (E213).

The two level two music classes also held separate recitals for parents and friends in late August. Students learning instruments for the first time along with more experienced players gave their first ever public performance as soloists and ensemble members. The audiences were highly appreciative of the performers and the event gave those musicians who normally do not have opportunities to showcase their work, performance experience in an enthusiastic and supportive environment. Student confidence was at an all time high and there were many proud grandparents who demonstrated their appreciation of the work performed.

This year, six music students have undertaken the new level 3 music UTAS Conservatorium Subject – Foundation Practical Studies. Successful completion of this subject not only attracts a TE score, but counts as a university unit – Hecs Free – for any degree other than Medicine and Engineering. For those students wishing to go on to study music at the Conservatorium the final exam is also viewed as part of the audition process. From the results of the mid- year assessment by Conservatorium staff, the Launceston College students are heading towards Distinctions and High Distinctions!

Congratulations to all music students who have continued to work creatively and passionately to maintain a highly exciting cultural environment and high standards in the Performing Arts at Launceston College.

Students have participated in preparation for work activities such as mock interviews, job applications and resume writing. They also completed two work placements during Terms I and 3.


































The international students have been busy this year focussing on their studies.

The Drama Level 3 class performed Chronicles of the French Revolution which was a fantastic ensemble piece.






These cars are powered by CO₂ cylinders and run down a 20 metre track that is equipped with timing equipment accurate to .001 of a second.

The cars are designed in collaboration with a range of Design and Engineering professionals from within the local community.


In addition to producing and racing the cars, students must produce a Design Folio, participate in an interview with a judging panel and present a "trade" style booth at the State Finals.
