Principal's Report

As Launceston College prepares to celebrate the centenary of secondary education in Tasmania in 2013 it is somewhat ironic that this will also be the year that the state debates 11/12 tops in all high schools and district schools.

Launceston Matriculation College, Launceston Community College and Launceston College have weathered many educational storms since Launceston High School was formed in 1913 and I have every confidence that in time rational

decision making will ultimately see a continuing future for colleges.

Over the last ten years the enrolment at Launceston College has increased significantly, from the mid-900s to 1450 students in 2012. The enrolment figures for 2013 are similarly high, indicating high levels of satisfaction with the educational outcomes this college facilitates. The professionalism and commitment of Launceston College staff in supporting all students' to gain their highest outcome possible is the major strength of this organisation.

Of interest is the number of students from non-government schools choosing to undertake their years 11 and 12 education at Launceston College, enrolments from this group having steadily risen over the last decade.


Within this Churinga you will note examples of the high level outcomes of LC students; last year for example 12 of our students were rated in the top 100 TCE outcomes in the state. You will also note the significant academic, sporting, Performing Arts and Musical accomplishments of our students and further, see involvement of students from associated schools that LC nurtures within our programs.

The Esk Band, an LC program, is a prime example of Launceston College using our personnel expertise and commitment to contribute more widely to student needs. This program teaches music to approximately 300 primary school students and 75 high school students at a level not seen elsewhere in this state. The fact that experienced students from this program, comprising the LC Orchestral Band won gold at the recent Melbourne Band Festival competing against the top private schools in Melbourne is evidence that quality remains a characteristic of this organisation.

Similarly LC as a college is able to undertake musical productions on a scale that challenges and elevates the learning for students involved. An example of that success is the fact that the 2012 musical has the record for a totally sold out season at The Princess Theatre, seven shows, 7000 patrons! Dance Fever also includes students from primary and high school working with our LC students in a highly professional event.

Launceston College takes pride in our heritage, and pride in the fact that after 100 years a high percentage of the young people of Launceston and surrounding areas still see this organisation as offering them the best opportunity for success in study and in their future careers.

Churinga Magazine has been there through it all

The evolution of Launceston College began with the introduction of the Northern State High School in 1913. From its humble, yet revolutionary, beginning in Charles Street as an experiment to provide public high school education for students after grade six, it became Launceston High School on its current site.

It remained L.H.S till 1964 when again it was part of an experiment into post year 10 education and became Launceston Matriculation College. In 1980 it again changed its name. The broadening curriculum led to Launceston Community College for four years and finally Launceston College since 1985. The first school magazine was published in 1914 and was called The Northern Churinga. The title was chosen by the late Mr. A.L.Meston. 'Churinga' is the name given to certain sacred objects by the indigenous people of Central Australia. No woman or uninitialed youth was permitted to see the Churinga which were kept in a sacred place. Only after passing through the ceremonies of manhood could a man know their whereabouts. The wooden churinga that the school used in the early years belonged to a member of the frog totem. The large circles represent gum trees. The trees are connected by the frog totem legends.

The first principal stated that The Northern Churinga 'was a bond of union between present, past and future students'. That sentiment has been an important focus for the production of the magazine throughout its history.

Launceston College has a copy of every Churinga since 1914. We have scanned every page and every photograph. The photographs can be found on our centenary website, www.lccentenary.com.


Leadership Group





English Comms Class

We also wanted to encourage an awareness of the journey some of these young people have travelled in the hope that this contributes to tolerance, respect and the ability to share a friendship. Leading up to the day, some of our EAL students combined with Carl Hinde's English Foundation class to share stories of their culture, and prepare advertising for the day.

Nabin Gurung, a former LC student and now apprentice chef at the Black Cow, come in to

organise the cooking and preparation of the momos in the morning. EAL students and some mainstream students gathered around a table to wrap the momos – making 800 of them! A big learning curve for some! It was an extremely successful day, allowing the EAL students to value their culture and share it with others. The obvious enjoyment staff and students found in eating the momos made it a wonderful experience for them. Those who came along to sample the momos also learnt a little more about

a different culture and the journeys some of our students have made, by reading the

posters around the walls. The money raised was sent to organisations working with refugees still in the camps in Nepal, such as Caritas, Youth Friendly Centre and UNHCR.







Sydney Dance Trip *

In August a group of dance students from Launceston College embarked on a trip to Sydney for 3 days. Day one consisted of a visit to the harbour bridge and then two 1.5 hour classes at Sydney Dance Company. That evening students viewed the Bangarra performance of 'Terrain' in the drama theatre at the Sydney Opera House. Day two consisted of a 2 hour private dance class and then students attended 'A Chorus Line' at the Capitol Theatre before catching the monorail to dinner in Darling Harbour.

English Studies Indian Experience

MEDIA STUDIES



Media Studies in 2012 has been a productive year for both the Video and Radio classes. Students have investigated how we are a part of the language of media. Media Studies involves the very nature of what and how we communicate. Students have created media, investigated how to manipulate it and how it manipulates us.

Here at Launceston College, Media Studies are streamed into Radio and Video lines, both offering Level 2 and Pre-tertiary versions of the syllabus.

The college boasts the State's only live to air Student Radio Station. LCFM broadcasts 24 hours a day, 7 days a week at a frequency of 87.8 on the FM dial. LCFM broadcasts live shows in regular class-time, and pre-recorded material around the clock. In 2012 students have produced a variety of show formats, for example drive-time, documentary and journalistic pieces, music shows, social commentaries, radio plays and light hearted trivia and current affairs. You can tune in to LCFM at 87.8 on your FM dial, or listen to our stream via the web, the link is available on the Launceston College website.

Video production in 2012 has seen collaborations with the Launceston City Council, the Red Cross, and the Volunteers for Community organization, with film crews capturing the relationships in our community and creating short films for these organisations and their own folios. For the past two years we have also collaborated with the ABC and their regional coverage of the Junction Arts Festival.

Media Studies are also closely involved with the Performing Arts at the college filming the School's Productions of "Footloose" and "Dance Fever". 2012 Media students have also entered material for the MyState film festival, ABC's Heywire competition and the new Breath of Fresh Air Festival.







817 students spent the year studying one of the Maths courses at LC. The most popular subject was Maths Applied 3 with 228 students followed closely by Maths Applied 2 and Workplace Maths.

Students also participated in Maths activities outside the classroom competing in a number of competitions during the year – including the Tasmanian, the Australian, the challenging Urquhart and the ever popular Maths Relay where two teams of 4 students performed well on the 20 questions. One of our teams came third in the northern Maths Relay and James Smith and Tegan Craig gained Distinctions in the Australian Maths Competition.



LAUNCESTON COLLEGE STUDENT SECURES PLACE IN PRESTIGIOUS SCIENCE FORUM!

Tegan Craig from Launceston College has been selected to attend the National Youth Science Forum (NYSF) to be held in January 2013.



The NYSF, which is celebrating its 30th anniversary in 2013, brings together Australia's brightest young scientific minds for twelve days of lively debates on major scientific issues, and interactions with some of the country's premier research teams. The University of Western Australia, Curtin University of Technology and the Australian National University proudly host the Forum. As part of its 30th anniversary celebrations, the NYSF will also be holding several special events throughout the year, which students are encouraged to attend: and they might even meet alumni from the very first Forum!

"Each year the students come to the Forum armed with knowledge about their local regions and areas of science", said Geoff Burchfield, Director of the National Youth Science Forum. "When given the opportunity to get together and discover the diversity that a career in the sciences can offer they soon realise that their nerve and imagination are their only restraints."

At the NYSF, students are able to pursue the particular branches of science, engineering and related subjects about which they are most passionate. They meet and talk with prominent scientists, to work in laboratories with these people and learn first hand what a life in science really means. They will gain hands on experience in diverse areas such as quantum physics, climate change, marine science, surgery, engineering and much more.

"NYSF students get inspired by the wide range of university and career options that the program showcases and many of our participants will go on to become tomorrow's scientific leaders," Mr Burchfield said. 92% of NYSF students enrol in a science or engineering degree at University and 85% continue to work in a related field.

Launceston College's Tika Varma Wins Science Teacher Award

The Australian Academy of Science in Canberra was founded in 1954 by Australian Fellows of the Royal Society of London with the distinguished physicist Sir Mark Oliphant as founding President. The Academy works towards promoting, encouraging and rewarding science in Australia through a range of activities. The four main programs of the Academy are recognition of outstanding contributions to science, education and public awareness, science policy and international relations.

Each year the Australian Academy of Science sponsors one teacher from each state and territory to attend its annual **Science at the Shine Dome** conference in Canberra and Tika Varma was delighted to receive an Australian Academy of Science Teachers' Award to attend the Science at the Shine Dome conference from 2-4 May this year in Canberra.

The teacher awardees from all across Australia were presented with their award by Professor Jenny Graves (AO FAA, Secretary, Education and Public Awareness) at The Education Workshop for teachers at the Ian Potter house. Each teacher awardee gave a presentation describing some of the techniques and/or resources used to successfully communicate science to students. The workshop gave the teacher awardees the opportunity to exchange ideas and curriculum materials with interstate colleagues and discuss the national curriculum. The visit to the QUESTACON in the afternoon was a good opportunity to gather resources for teaching of science.

Tika teaches Environmental Science, Biology and Physical Science at Launceston College and The Australian Academy of Science Teacher Award enabled her to apply her learning about Antarctica to all three of her pre-tertiary classes, but especially to Environmental Science and Biology. Tika said that the formal dinner with Fellows of the Academy and an informal dinner with young researchers, allowed her to build valuable networks and find inspirational role models for her students.







Skyping Heather Rose: a Tasmanian Author



On Friday 31 August, English Writing students were treated to a presentation by Tasmanian author Heather Rose via Skype in the theatrette. With six English Writing classes, Launceston College has the largest group of students enrolled in this subject in the state.

Rose not only spoke about the writing process for her acclaimed novel *The Butterfly Man*, but also talked about important considerations for students to keep in mind when planning, researching and writing their own work. Rose emphasised to students that most authors work endlessly, using the analogy of a sculptor. "Just as a sculptor in wood has 300 grades of sandpaper, so too a writer must apply varying degrees of finishing." She stressed the connections between reading and writing, reiterating the importance of reading to teach students about craft and imagination.



Rose was impressed at the depth of knowledge shown by students' questions and made a point of saying how pleased she was that Tasmania offered a creative writing course at pre-tertiary level, allowing students to develop both their writing skills and their imagination.

2012 has been an exciting year for students enrolled in Certificate 1 in Workplace Skills.

Students have studied Occupational Health and Safety, customer service, industrial relations, working cooperatively, job searching and interview skills, using appropriate equipment and technology, workplace communications, numeracy and First Aid.

The recent Enterprise activity saw students involved in planning and carrying out small retail projects like BBQS, selling slices, milkshakes and hot dogs in Col Lane. The students enjoyed the challenge and learnt about planning, cooperation and basic retail. They were able to practise their customer service and numeracy skills.

Classes in customer service allowed students to rehearse correct ways of dealing with the public in retail situations. Role Play was also a significant teaching and learning strategy when students rehearsed job interviews and presented them for assessment.

Students have also been intensively involved in OH&S study and have developed a practical understanding of how to be safe at work. One activity saw students recording sound levels with a decibel meter and comparing these to the acceptable level that does not damage hearing.

Students have also ventured out of the college on excursions to visit various workplaces to gain first-hand experience of different working environments. Students enjoyed a day trip to Devonport and visited businesses such as the Christmas Hills Raspberry Farm and the House of Anvers. Community visits were also conducted to the Launceston City Council, Service Tasmania and the Museum. Guest speakers gave accounts of their experiences and current knowledge.

A major component of this course for students was a series of work placements throughout the year. Students have had the opportunity to be involved in 3 work placements in a multitude of jobs including: farming, automotive, hospitality, retail, beauty, building, office work, child care, trades, aged care and many more.

Launceston College would like to thank the many businesses who provided the students with such valuable experience and opportunities.

This year has been very successful. A number of students have found employment while others have been able to decide and start on a definite career pathway. Students have gained many important skills as they experienced the challenges of the world of work.




BAR OPERATIONS


