# Principal's Report


Churinga is one of the great traditions of Launceston College – its goal is to capture the year that was; the people, the learning and the stories that invariably result from one year's interaction of 1500 people on a city block.

In some respects it is published too soon, as the student results of the year are not available at publishing time. Instead, to balance the social perspectives of the year book we have to indicate last year's student results and anticipate the ongoing improvements in student outcomes that have been characteristic of Launceston College over the years.

Last year's student cohort had the distinction of becoming the first in the state to reach an average of 80% Tasmanian Certificate of Education attainment. This was a remarkable achievement for the class of 2014, given the numerous alternative learning goals of students and the fact that this College has an open door policy to students – we are not selective of enrolments. Rather, this College has as its goal to work with each student who comes through our doors to support them to reach their potential academically and socially. The smiling faces of the students in the pages of this yearbook are evidence of a high achieving College, with a student body that feels connected to the life of their College.

I have the expectation that *Churinga* will inform the community of the class of 2015's high level student outcomes in next year's publication. Visitors to Launceston College frequently comment on both the

environment.



As for student and staff interaction – the comment from visitors usually is that the atmosphere is more like a small university than a school, and that it is a working atmosphere that is reflective of the Launceston College tradition.

Year books become more valuable as the years pass. I suggest you sequester your *Churinga* away so that in ten years you can revisit the memories of what I sincerely hope has been a successful year at Launceston College, one that supported you in your goals for your future.



# Student Representative Council

In 2015, Launceston College's Student Representative Council has been incredibly active and involved in the College community. We have organised and participated in several fantastic events. Thanks to the efforts of our members, both students and teachers, we have supported many charities and helped to improve our school life.





At the start of the school year, the SRC ran a 'Be Brave and Shave' event to raise funds for the Leukaemia Foundation. Eight volunteers shaved or cut their hair to raise awareness and funds for this charity. The VET Hairdressing class hair sprayed students' hair with many bright colours. Altogether, the SRC raised over \$800 for the Leukaemia Foundation. The SRC assisted with proposing a Facebook page for the College, which culminated in its eventual establishment. The SRC recognises the wide reach of social media, and has capitalised on this throughout the year to increase the publicity of events. Thank you to Henry Austin-Stone and Nathaniel Bott for formulating the proposal. To support 'The National Anti-Bullying Day', the SRC coordinated a campaign against bullying within our school. This saw students participating in a poster design competition in order to combat bullying.

Every year, we have students from Thailand come to our school for two weeks. The SRC helped to welcome the five visiting students from Suankularb Wittayalai College with coordinated tours, performances, and various social events. The SRC has been actively involved in the improvement of course delivery in our College, through assisting with the development of teaching standards. Keith Wenn, our principal, asked for our advice and opinions to gain the perspectives of some students.

At the centenary of Anzac Day Service this year, the SRC had a major presence at the Launceston march and service. Our members proudly represented the College during the march, and paid our respects with musical and dramatic performances, heartfelt speeches and a slideshow within our school.



The SRC has been involved with the World Vision 40 Hour Famine this year. We were pleased to make a sizeable contribution to World Vision, thanks to the kind donations of staff and students. We also have raised funds this year to aid the people in Nepal recovering from the major earthquake. To do so, we held a 'Colour Day', where we asked students to wear blue and bring a donation. As an additional fundraiser, the SRC enlisted the help of chef Nabin from the Black Cow restaurant, as well as our own Nepalese students, to make and sell traditional Nepalese dumplings. Overall, the SRC raised \$2018 for Oxfam.

An exciting opportunity arose for our SRC in the form of a Q&A session with the Launceston City Council. As young members of the community, it was a fantastic opportunity to voice our concerns and suggestions for a better Launceston. Thank you to Tyler Hindrum and Joshua Newell for representing the SRC at the event. The SRC had a considerable influence upon the College Ball this year. The theme of the Ball was 'Hollywood Glamour', and the event was highly successful and memorable. The SRC assisted with the planning, organisation and set-up of the event.

# **English and Languages**

#### **English and Languages articles by James Wells**

2015 has been a big year for the languages department. English is the largest learning area at Launceston College and is spread across three buildings. This year, students of all language courses have been offered many exciting opportunities to excel in their area of study.

In Term 2 this year, students of English Writing 3C were invited to a workshop held by published author and former LC student Lyndon Riggall, who talked about how to engage audiences, stand out as a writer and to be a successful author. In term 3, classes were again visited by Lyndon Riggall, who talked about sources of inspiration for the major writing project undertaken by students of the subject.

Last year, LC reintroduced Chinese (Mandarin) to the syllabus in response to

student requests as well as Australia's growing relationship with Asian

countries. This year, students of last year's group progressed to the pre-tertiary level, learning all about language – practising to speak confidently as well as writing in Chinese characters – and the culture in general through video, audio and phone apps. This year's group was a mixed class of three pre-tertiary students and seven foundation students. This group has been given several opportunities to enhance their knowledge and their confidence in Chinese language and culture such as an excursion to ChiChi Café in St. John Street. In term 2 this year, Ms Yang Liu from Beijing, China visited the College to teach the students many fascinating aspects of Chinese language and culture. She taught students to make Chinese dumplings (or 'Jiaozi') which made quite a mess, but eaten with soy





sauce using Chinese chopsticks were a real treat. Everyone agreed that homemade dumplings were much tastier than the ones their teacher occasionally buys ready-made.

# English as an Additional Language 3

In March the EAL3 class was joined by four young men who were visiting Launceston College from Thailand. This visit inspired two excursions of significant interest to our visitors and class members. Following a lesson based around local government, the class enjoyed a delightful visit to the Town Hall, the meeting place for the Launceston City Council. After a welcome and interesting presentation by Elizabeth Clarke, who explained some of the special features of the council crest and history, students enjoyed sitting in the Council Chambers and seeing the

table around which the aldermen and Mayor sit. Generous hospitality included an extensive morning tea, where we were joined by Principal Keith Wenn and Mayor, Albert Van Zetten. One of the Thai students played the grand piano and lots of fun photos were taken. It was also a wonderful opportunity for sharing knowledge and understanding between our group and the council.

Another insightful experience was a visit to the Newnham campus of UTas. Students enjoyed seeing the beauty of the campus and some of the upgraded

facilities in the Business Faculty. A special thrill was a visit to the Health Sciences faculty, in particular the area used in Nursing education. Students appreciated the presentation about the facilities and being trusted to 'hands on' experiences with 'patients' demonstrating real medical problems. It certainly inspired some in the group to consider Nursing as a future pathway.

### Drama

The year started with a refurbishment of the Drama area and the works that had been going on over summer were still being finished as the Year 11s made their way into the Drama Room on the first day of school, with final carpet tiles being laid as we started our first lesson. The staff and students have really appreciated the College's support in this development and it has made for an amazing learning area in 2015. We look forward to an extension being built on the Eastern side of the area over the upcoming summer to house our technical production requirements.

Our first production for the year was The Tempest which was a co-production with UTAS and was performed in February at The Annexe Theatre. This is the fourth Shakespeare play we have performed biennially and was produced in part to support the students in English Literature who were studying the play. It also gave all Drama students an early play to watch for critical appraisals. The play starred teachers Cheyne Mitchell and Travis Hennessey, alongside Stephanie Francis, Lachy Murphy, Hamish White, Freya Allen, Meg Sydes and Maddie Leslie; with UTAS theatre students making up the remainder of the cast.

Term 2 started with the Theatre Performance classes presenting their mid-year plays After Juliet, The Sea and The Children. These classes then presented the highly popular Avant Garde performances which was a fantastic end to the term. In Term 3 the Drama 3 classes performed two versions of The Arabian Nights, one a more traditional poetic version and the other a fantastic piece of physical theatre.

Term 3 also saw 38 students and four staff travel to Sydney for three nights for a Drama Trip which coincided with Dance and English Trips. Highlights included a visit to NIDA, attending the opening night of *Matilda*, tours of the ABC and Sydney Theatre Company, a workshop









with Paige Rattray and a performance of Bell Shakespeare's *The Tempest* at the Sydney Opera House.





### My ANZAC Experience

On 16 April I was one of seven Tasmanian students who were chosen to venture to Gallipoli for the ANZAC Centenary. This was an unbelievable honour and I knew it would be a surreal experience, especially as I had never travelled overseas before. The trip was for 14 days between Istanbul and Gallipoli, two completely different and incredible places. One thing that amazed me throughout the trip was the Turkish people and the love they have for Australians. The ANZACs were defeated at Gallipoli, but their fighting spirit that held the Turks up for months on end is the reason they commanded the Turks' respect, and why the Turkish people welcome back Australian visitors with open arms. I took a small Australian Rules football with me and throughout the trip I was surprised to see the locals' response to it. We often found ourselves having a kick with them!

We made our way to the dawn service at 8pm the night before, rugged up in seven or so layers. We got through the cold and windy night but no one complained as we all knew this was nothing in comparison to what the ANZACs endured. The sun began to rise and I'll never forget one moment in particular. The minute of silence was touching with not a sound made by any of the 10,000 people there. This is where the ANZAC legend was born 100 years ago.

This was truly an experience I will never forget and I would encourage each and every person to visit Gallipoli in their lifetime if given the opportunity. The ANZACs gave their lives so we could live ours.



# Technology and IT

### Computer Graphics and Design

This year, students from our Technology and IT classes have been working on a combination of sketching interior and exterior designs as well as modelling. Students have also learnt to experiment with animations and architectural designs. Throughout the course of the year, students were required to model a spaceship and convert a shipping container into a house, designing

### VET Construction Pathways

Students have enjoyed a busy year undertaking a wide range of theoretical and practical activities related to the construction industry. The course introduces students to many basic but crucial elements of the industry including: calculations, plan reading, communication, organising and working effectively, all blanketed with a Workplace Health and Safety focus.

The world of Mathematics is more interesting than what you'd expect!

Launceston College offers a variety of maths courses as maths is an essential skill for a productive future...no matter what level you intend to study and no matter what career you intend to follow. All our maths courses are challenging, rewarding, interesting and a great way for students to meet new people and broaden their horizons in the world of mathematics, regardless of the level studied.

Students have the opportunity to be involved in activities outside the classroom too by 'having a go' in the Australian Maths Competition or the Urquhart Maths Competition, or by putting together a team for the Maths Relay that is held at a local school. There is even the chance to get involved in our own Fun Trivia Maths Competitions at our You Day stall in Col Lane at the beginning of the year.

There are plenty of opportunities to extend the maths learning outside of the classroom and to create some fond memories. Our very successful



participants in the Australian Maths Competition this year were: Sila Han, Jess Horton, Hannah Wilcox, Chris Bounds and Scanlon Williams.

Workplace Maths and Everyday Maths give students the necessary skills required for many occupations. Classes are full of interesting, practical activities and build on previous skills to ensure that once in the workplace, their maths skills are solid. The learning in class is centred on developing good techniques and making sense of numbers by applying maths to real world activities and problems.

General Maths 2 and 3 apply lots of equations with a practical approach to Mathematics. Students in these classes

learn valuable skills in finance, world geometry, bivariate data, growth and decay and network analysis- essential skills for those who want a solid grounding for future success. The course has a strong emphasis on applying maths to real life investigations and activities.

Maths Methods levels 2 and 3 are pathways leading to understanding the roots of mathematics and how to apply maths to the world to make life easier. Students focus on learning algebraic techniques and applying them to real life. For all the people who doubt algebra's importance, algebra is designed for the philosophical thinkers and mathematically inclined... it's a tool that allows you to do the maths now and worry about the numbers later (usually in front of a calculator).












# Maths

### Science

This year the Young Tassie Scientists inspired great things at Launceston College. In April a few scientifically dedicated students travelled to Hobart for a Science Forum held by the Young Tassie Scientists, a program run by UTAS to inspire science among youth across all educational mediums. From this event these keen students brought back the idea of the Big Brain Break, essentially a morning tea dedicated to science discussion. This would be aimed at increasing scientific interest among those who cower away from the great challenge of science. As soon as school resumed, SRC meetings were held to organise the event which was to be held during National Science Week. Soon, this event turned into a whole day dedicated to science and then to the whole week, dedicated to all realms of science, from Biology to Chemistry to Physics. After many months of organising, planning and cake baking the week began. It started with a visit from the Young Tassie Scientist, John Adulcikas, who gave a talk on his work in Microbiology. John is doing a PhD about his research into the bacterial conditions of estuaries in Tasmania, looking at regions where particular bacterial life lives. His work may be used to indicate where more stringent farming procedures needed, and to indicate sources of safe water for drinking and swimming.

The biggest event during Launceston College's science week affairs was an entire day devoted to educating the wider Launceston College Community about the wonders of science. With more than 20 *Science Heroes* running a myriad of activities. In Biology there were a number of sheep plucks being dissected, a table showing transpiration

in celery, UV light showing how dirty we all truly are and a number of models of many things, from hearts to lungs to cells. For Chemistry there were splints that all burned different colours from red to green, blue and pink, super saturated solutions which turned solid when poured, a solution which changed colour when stirred and the always coveted elephant's toothpaste.

Finally for Physics there were a number of experiments showing gyroscopic progression where a wheel was spun which could then be used to direct a person on a wheeled board. Another similar experiment showed the wheel being spun and then balanced on various points on the Science Hero's body, such as the chin, finger and leg. Finally, there was a pendulum wave experiment showing how energy spreads through waves. A number of brass balls were suspended incrementally onto a frame which when let go, the balls formed many amazing patterns. This day proved to be absolutely amazing, with many non-science students having a scientific

experience for the ages. To finish the week we had two more speakers, Tina Oldham and Stephen Hindrum. Tina is another Young Tassie Scientist who gave a talk about her work in Marine Ecology and was also attended by many students from many different science backgrounds. Stephen's talk was about Quantum Mechanics and featured Angie the quantum tunnelling dog as well as some roses. His talk explored how quantum mechanics is the next stage in scientific discovery and how it may be everywhere, from flowers to dogs.

National Science Week at Launceston College has been a huge success and would never have happened without the stellar effort from Madiyantika Varma, Jess Horton Jodie Blackburn, Tyrone Blair and Rod Hutchins.

### Chemistry 4

Chemistry is another pre tertiary science course offered by Launceston College. It is one of the two science courses to be dubbed a 'Level 4', because level 3 wasn't terrifying enough. Our year in Chemistry has been an amazing one, with many great colours, explosions, smells and antics. Through titrations and timer reactions we have seen many a pretty colour, from pink to deep orange to peach to deep black. We have also seen our fair share of explosions, although generally at the hand of particular students. Through the Esters practical we have also created a myriad of smells, from apple to orange to sarsaparilla to vomit. ### Australia in Asia and the Pacific

In Australia in Asia and the Pacific, also known as AAP, students have had a busy year. A lot happens in our region, and as the year unfolded our level of understanding deepened. The year saw tragic natural disasters such as Cyclone Pam in Vanuatu, and the Nepal Earthquake. Our study of why earthquakes and cyclones occur, and of these countries in detail, added a layer of depth and understanding to what was happening for the people in these places.

The unfolding refugee crisis prompted us to look deeper into the experience of refugees and government policies over time. It has many of us reflecting on what we would do if it were us and not them.

But it was not all bad news, as we explored the tourism industry in our region, and the costs and benefits to both Australian destinations and the wider region; we are all planning our next holidays with eyes wide open!

Exploring our nation's multicultural culture was enriched by an Indian lunch and a Bollywood movie, which was enjoyed by everyone – food being one of the more obvious ways in which our culture is enriched by migrants. In short, we have come to appreciate just how diverse our country and the Asia Pacific region are, in both the people and the environment.

### Modern History

In Modern History the class has studied three major units over the course of the year. To start the year they focussed on Germany between 1918 and 1945, looking particularly at the drivers of change. Next they looked at China between 1949 and 1976, the years in which the nation was under the communist rule of Mao Zedong. This was followed by a study of the U.S.A. which was compared to China. Finally they studied the Cold War and looked at the differing perspectives of historians.

Students who went on the Humanities trip to Melbourne were able to meet Lucia, a Polish survivor of the Holocaust, who told us of her life during and after the Second World War. Her story was truly inspiring and it gave the Modern History students an insight into the more personal side of that era which is often lost amongst statistics and numbers.

### Philosophy

Philosophy students contemplate and evaluate the big questions in life. What is consciousness? Is there a God? How do we live a 'good' life? Challenging problems and dynamic discussion characterised the class as usual. 
### Asian Studies

Asian Studies is a UTAS/College Program subject new this year. Likewise, an excursion to the Cataract Gorge with respected Tasmanian

Aboriginal Elder, Patsy Cameron, gave us hands on experiences of an ochre ceremony, bush medicine and Dreaming stories. An excursion to Hobart to hear philosopher Peter Vardy got us all thinking about how do we know what is right or wrong, and we finished the year contemplating how the universe came into existence – no question is too big for this class!



### Music

Launceston College has a thriving Music Department, with students given many opportunities to expand their creative capabilities over a wide range of subjects including Contemporary Music, Audio Design, Music 3C and UTAS Foundation Practical courses. These courses enable students to learn how to make music, create music, be exposed to music genres and history, theory and notation, as well as learning valuable performance skills and about the music industry in Australia.

Events throughout the year gave students the opportunity to perform to the wider community, the first of which was the annual Awards Ceremony, where Darcy O'Malley provided a musical prelude on Classical Guitar and former student, Zoe Merrington, a vocal solo.

One of the major events in the musical calendar is the Launceston Competitions, where both classical and contemporary musicians, soloists, bands and ensembles take to the stage in a wide range of sections. Performances this year have included: winning the shield for Champion Choir 19 Years and Under at the Launceston Competitions at the end of May, singing the Swahili peace song, Amani, at Dance Fever September, and the Graduation Ceremony in November.

### Music



### Symphonic Band

Launceston College Symphonic Band, directed by Peter Quigley, is made up of musicians from Launceston College, local schools and the community. It has been one of the biggest years for the band, making the history books as the first Northern Tasmanian band to compete in the A Grade section for the Tasmanian Band Championships in Hobart on 12 September.

As well as rehearsing for the love of making music every Thursday afternoon, the band has performed many times this year. These have included: the Launceston Competitions, with the band gaining a score of 98 out a possible 100; the Evandale ANZAC Day Ceremony; Victorian Schools Band Festival in Geelong on 8 and 9 August, winning the platinum shield, performing in the finale concert and participating in a conductors' workshop with Dr Kevin Cameron and the Beijing Youth Palace Wind Symphony; and also taking out the Open D grade and Junior C grade shields Tasmanian Band Championships.

### Visual Arts

The Visual Arts Department gives LC Students the opportunity to express themselves through different art mediums including photography, art and graphic design. Level two students explore a range of art genres and techniques, whilst pre-tertiary art students work towards creating an exhibition of work to display as part of their final assessment.

An exciting event on the Visual Arts scene was a visit on 13 August by the Artists in Residence of Art Skool, Mel Fidler and Paul Eggins, who shared their work with staff and students. They gave talks and masterclasses, and ran workshops, and worked with students to install paste ups to make a mural within the Art Department.

Also on 24 August was the major visual art event of the College's calendar: the LC Biennale. This involved a major exhibition of students' art work, both level 2 and 3, from all areas of art, photography and graphic design, including interpretations of art by other art disciplines of music, drama and dance. The night was a great success and a wonderful experience for students - "a celebration of art in all its many forms." Kate Camm, (Art Teacher)

Seve De Angelis and Alex Hancock are both Year 12 students, studying Art Studio Practice this year. They are currently preparing for their end of year exhibitions, with Seve focussing on self-portraits and alter-egos through the use of colours as a mask for darker imagery, and Alex creating animated portraits of strangers, using rotoscope on video frames.



### Media

Media Production at Launceston College provides an insight into the concepts and technology that fuels the constant flow of visual and audio media information that surrounds us. The College boasts the state's only live to air Student Radio Station, LCFM, and a range of contemporary film production facilities and equipment. Media Studies is streamed into Radio and Video lines, offering both foundation and pre-tertiary courses. Understanding and using media is increasingly central in all our lives, and offers an industry pathway within design, broadcast production and the entertainment industry.

The year in the Media Department began with a visit from Australian filmmaker, Oliver West, holding a filmmaking master class for Video Media students. Students were able to examine indoor and outdoor lighting techniques and finer points of camerawork, and hear about Oliver's experiences in the industry.

Media students also played a big part in the promotion of 2015's Production *Bring It On.* The Production VLOG, followed the progress of the cast and crew as the 2015 production neared its season at the Princess Theatre.

During Terms 3 and 4 the Media Department also collaborated with Cityprom to complete anti-shoplifting advertisements, films for pre-tertiary folios and the Mystate film competition. LC Media students were on hand to film *'Dance Fever'* and the Graduation and Awards Ceremony.
