



## Principal's Report



I am extremely honoured to be in the position of Principal at Launceston College. In a world that can sometimes be confusing, uncertain and quite frankly confronting, we offer our students clarity, certainty, optimism and support to see the great things that can lie ahead for each of them.

This year, visits to classrooms, talking with students in and around the campus, has been a highlight of my work. Seeing students grow and mature into young adults through the nurturing and inspiration that they are given by their teachers, fills me with hope for what can certainly be a positive future.

I trained many years ago as a Kindergarten teacher welcoming 4 and 5 year olds into the world of formal learning, which was an absolute delight. The anticipation of what was to come for those little people gave me much joy. Now at the opposite end of the compulsory education journey, I feel the same positive anticipation as I see young people moving into the next stage of their growth with the knowledge that we have done as much as possible to prepare them for what is to come.

This year we have had an even tighter focus on ensuring that every student is known, safe, well and learning. This has been made possible through a process of one-on-one conversations with all teachers about individual student progress in every class. This is no mean feat with over 1400 students; however, what has struck me during this process is how deeply teachers know each learner and also know what it is that they need to achieve success.

The development of a new data platform that provides information about learning and engagement has assisted teachers and leaders to get a better understanding of the students' learning across a range of subjects, thus allowing for focussed intervention and support where required. Our teachers have embraced this data and incorporated it into their overall understanding of student progress and success. Our work continues to be guided by the DECYP strategic plan and our LC Culture of Excellence document where our focus remains on 'Making a Positive Difference for Every Learner, Every Day.'

One aspect of note this year has been the way in which our students have embraced some of our new expectations in relation to ensuring respectful, focussed behaviour. We have continued the 'phones off' expectation in classrooms that was implemented in our neighbouring secondary schools, with great benefit. A spin off from this has been the way that students have engaged in social interactions with each other – not just via screens! A focus on teachers greeting and welcoming students into classrooms and in passing each other around the campus has resulted in a positive and optimistic tone across our College.

The library has continued to be a place of meeting and learning with many students drawn to the relaxed, calm and interesting environment. This space has been truly embraced by all with its comfortable and sociable furniture arrangements, as well as its quiet study carrels and segregated study spaces. This enhancement has also seen an increase in our circulation data due as well to the quality and variety of texts – fiction and non-fiction – catching the interest of our students. We are continually looking at ways to ensure that our College is an inspiring place for young people to learn and connect and these facility improvements certainly allow this to happen.

Across all our Learning Areas, the commitment, passion and support provided by our teaching staff remains a constant. It is an absolute delight to witness so many of our students reaching personal goals, achievements and potential as a result of quality teaching and care.

My thanks as always to staff – teaching and non-teaching – who have worked tirelessly to ensure that our College is a great place for all. Without their commitment and focus on excellence in teaching and relationships, none of us would thrive.

I am looking forward with great anticipation to another wonderful year in 2026.

### **Business and Law**

It's been another year of rich learning and discovery across the Business and Law Learning Area, with our four Level 3 offerings growing to nine classes. In Business Studies, students proposed their own entrepreneurial ideas ranging from Xplore, an online travel app, to EWE Track, a tracking device for sheep; Accounting took on financial statement preparation and analysis; Legal Studies unpacked the rights of the accused in Australia's adversary system; while Economics students learned to identify inelasticity of demand by adopting some High School Musical dance moves (thanks for making that connection, Oli – try and restrain yourself during the end-of-year exam though).

In March, Alexandra Macfarlane won a place at the National Schools Constitutional Convention in Canberra, where she watched the Federal Budget being handed down in Parliament House and attended a reception hosted by the Governor-General. Alongside Jan Vinz Avance, Lilly Campbell, Wade Westwood, Ahlia Norton-Smith, Ella Morphet and Liam McIlwain, Alex also completed the UCP Accounting Course, with students giving up an afternoon each week to attend the UTAS campus. Finally, both Alex and fellow Legal Studies student, Aysha Mohamed, rounded out a challenging study load by undertaking introductory law units through the University's High Achiever Program.

Our teachers also made sure they kept up their own learning, attending a BEAT PL with Launceston industry and UTAS, as well as the Reserve Bank's Teacher Immersion Event in Sydney. Legal Studies teacher, Simone, hosted a LawFest Q&A with the Hon. Justice Kate Cuthbertson from Tasmania's Supreme Court, while Kerri arranged for a group of Business Foundation students to participate in an event run by the Launceston Chamber of Commerce, supported by CEO Alina Baine, Deputy Mayor Hugh Mackenzie, and local businesses Sweetbrew, St Luke's, S. Group and Multicap.
































## Children's Services

### **Working with Children**

It was a busy year for the Working with Children classes. Both classes organised fortnightly playgroup sessions, which were attended by family educators, parents, and children from the local community. Each class took responsibility for planning and creating a variety of activities for each themed playgroup. Some of the themes included oceans; fairytales and magical worlds; animals; the galaxy; dinosaurs; Book Week; and a teddy bears' picnic. Students collaborated in teams to design activities focusing on sensory, craft, manipulative, gross motor, and imaginative play.

Additionally, the students had the opportunity to visit Riverbend Park for the unit Safety and Young Children, where they investigated outdoor play spaces, innovative and safe playground design, and risk management.

For some, the two-year program provided the chance to complete the full qualification, while others, with only one year available, were able to gain a partial qualification suited to their needs.

Our students excelled in their workplace experiences, where they were able to put their classroom learning into practice. Grade 11 students enjoyed a oneweek placement in childcare centres, engaging with children, implementing activities, and assisting educators with daily routines. It was a valuable introduction to

Grade 12 students combined their in-class studies with 160 hours of workplace experience across Terms 2 and

3. At this stage of the course, they demonstrated strong knowledge of children's learning and development, health and safety practices, and the ability to foster respectful relationships with children and families. They also embraced inclusive practices, upheld professional responsibilities, and carried out the full range of educator tasks—working alongside staff as valued members of the team.

## **English**

It's been a busy year in the English block and the other College areas where English and English as an Additional Language are delivered. The usual great crowd of regular EALD students were joined by many international visitors as the year progressed, including young people from Brazil, Italy and Switzerland. They have greatly added to our cultural diversity and enriched our College life. This year teachers have commented on an overall improvement in students' enthusiasm and their capacity to work hard in their studies. For this reason, it was especially hard for teachers to select just one subject award winner in each class when there were so many potential recipients. It's pleasing to see the close correlation between consistent attendance and success in every subject. Students who are in class, paying attention, and developing their knowledge and skills are being rewarded with pleasing results for their efforts.

This year we welcomed Cameron Clarke to our experienced team of teachers. He brings a wealth of knowledge with him from his high school teaching and has established productive relationships with his students. Our assistant principal, Mandy Wenn, continues to offer outstanding support to our teaching team. She has had a positive impact on many of our students. ## **English**

### English as an Additional Language Levels 1, 2 and 3

It has been a wonderful year in English as an Additional Language, with students developing their writing, speaking, listening, and reading skills across Levels 1, 2, and 3. Our classes bring together a vibrant mix of students from many countries, including Afghanistan, Italy, Brazil, Switzerland, Germany, Japan, China, Korea, Thailand, India, Vietnam, the Philippines, and more. This rich diversity has created an engaging, supportive and fun environment for learning.

In Term 1, we enjoyed a visit to the Queen Victoria Museum and Art Gallery to view *The First Tasmanians* exhibition, deepening our understanding of Tasmanian Aboriginal history and culture. Throughout the year, we explored persuasive, narrative, analytical, and comparative writing, and students can be especially proud of their stunning persuasive advertisements designed for the creating multimodal texts criterion. These colourful and creative ads brighten our classroom walls.

We also celebrated events such as NAIDOC Week and Harmony Day through tasks that prepared Level 3 students for their exams, while encouraging all students to reflect on Australia's cultural diversity. Our Film Studies, including *Hunt for the Wilderpeople* and *Lion*, offered rich opportunities to practise analysing multimodal texts, while exploring themes of belonging, resilience, and identity.

A particular highlight has been the Negotiated Studies, where students submitted essays and PowerPoints of high quality. Their brilliant class presentations demonstrated confidence and impressive speaking skills.

Students across all levels should be very proud of their achievements this year. Their hard work, creativity, positive attitudes and collaboration have made EAL a truly rewarding subject in 2025.

## Languages

#### **Greek and Latin Club**

2025 has been a busy year for ancient languages at LC. In Latin Club, we have been busily reading two comedies by the Latin comic playwright Plautus, the Aulularia and Amphitruo. Through these plays, students have learned several new verb tenses, comparative and superlative adjectives, and deponent verbs. We have also learned about some of the features of Roman comedy, Roman myth, and Roman culture and everyday life. In Greek Club, after conquering the Greek alphabet, students have been reading an engaging story of insurance fraud aboard a ship sailing from Byzantium to Athens. There are many benefits to learning foundational languages like Greek and Latin: they enhance students' understanding of English vocabulary, grammar, and syntax, build a strong knowledge of scientific language, and they're also a lot of fun!



### Japanese

In Japanese this year we have developed our speaking, reading, writing, and listening skills in the Japanese language, and have undertaken a number of cultural investigations. Some of the topics included: ancient Japan, Meiji Restoration, Tokugawa Shogunate, mental health in Japan, Kintsugi, Bushido, and Prince Shotoku.

Our cultural and historic findings have contextualised our language learning and led us to make new connections between Australian society and the cultural, technological, and economic phenomena of Japan.

#### French

#### Highlights of the Year

This year, beginner students learned to communicate in French about themselves, their families, clothing, favourite foods, homes, routines, studies, leisure activities, weather, and places in town.

We developed our listening, speaking, reading, and writing skills through engaging activities and consistent practice. Weekly tasks on Education Perfect supported our learning, while games like Jenga, Escape Room, and Kahoot made lessons fun and interactive.

Advanced students deepened their understanding by exploring more complex grammar, new verb tenses, and expanding their vocabulary. Everyone made fantastic progress, especially enjoying the different versions of Jenga to boost speaking confidence.

In Term 1, we explored French music through La Manie Musicale 2025, adding rhythm and excitement to our cultural learning. In May, students cooked and tasted authentic French crêpes, a delicious hands-on experience that brought Francophone culture to life! We also watched two beloved French films: Les Intouchables (starring Omar Sy) and La famille Bélier (featuring singer Louane), enriching our cultural journey.

Connect Ed offers a unique blend of academic and practical learning, with students completing Essential Skills English and Maths alongside hands-on activities that foster independence, confidence, and real-world readiness. This year, our program expanded in exciting ways, offering new opportunities for students to explore, create, and grow.

One of the highlights has been our **cooking program**, where students not only learned to prepare nutritious meals but also developed teamwork and planning skills. In Term 3, we introduced **barista training**, giving students a taste of hospitality industry skills, and added the **school garden** to our curriculum connecting students with sustainability, food production, and outdoor learning. We also introduced **basic sewing skills**, empowering students to repair their own clothes and appreciate the value of resourcefulness and creativity.

Career education has remained a strong focus. Students engaged in resume writing, online job applications, and explored career pathways tailored to their interests and strengths.

Looking ahead, we're excited to announce that next year, the program will evolve into **LC Flex**, operating from the **F Block space**. This will allow us to offer even more opportunities for personalised learning, practical skill development, and student-led exploration.

### Certificate II in Cookery and Certificate II in Hospitality

The Certificate II in Cookery and Certificate II in Hospitality students have had a busy and rewarding year, developing their practical skills while running our college restaurant, Elcies.

During Term 1, students launched a midmorning pop-up café, offering light meals, salads, and sandwiches to staff and peers. They progressed to a range of service styles, including breakfast, lunch, and dinner service periods in the restaurant, which were open to the public. Across the restaurant season in Terms 2 and 3. students delivered a variety of menus, including à la carte, buffet-style, set menus, canapé and cocktail evenings, and catered for special events such as the college production auction and the Careers Expo. Highlights of the year included hosting the ever-popular Christmas in July dinner and presenting our annual six-course Mediterranean degustation dinner.

We were also fortunate to welcome visitors from the Beacon Industry Expert Panel, which gave students the opportunity to ask questions and hear from mentors within the hospitality/cookery

Beyond the college, students further extended their skills through work placements in some of Launceston's leading hotels, restaurants, and cafés, gaining valuable hands-on industry experience. These opportunities not only allowed them to apply their learning in realworld environments, but also helped them build confidence, teamwork, and professionalism.

### Food and Hospitality Enterprise

In 2025, students developed their understanding of the hospitality and catering industries, building a foundation for future studies in VET Hospitality or Cookery and a range of career pathways. With access to the commercial kitchen, students gained hands-on experience preparing dishes for a variety of events. A highlight project involved designing their own product featuring a key Tasmanian ingredient.

To showcase their skills in catering and event planning, classes hosted high tea events in Elcies at the end of Term 2. Students prepared a selection of foods and served them with custom beverages in a formal setting, creating an enjoyable occasion for all involved.

Throughout the year, students contributed to both in-house and external catering opportunities. They refined their platter presentation skills, which supported cheese box sales and cheese platters for Art Gallery openings. Other activities included preparing savoury toast, Cornish pasties, quiches, ready-made meals, rainbow jelly slices, cupcakes for Wear It Purple Day and R U OK Day, muffins and biscuits for production events, and finishing the year with Elcie's Christmas pudding and sweets sales.

Alongside their practical work, students also focused on developing their vocabulary of subject-specific terms, enabling them to use industry language with increasing confidence in both written and practical contexts.





## **Food and Hospitality**

### Food, Cooking, and Nutrition 2

Food, Cooking, and Nutrition 2 students have had a dynamic and rewarding year, building a wide range of practical skills and kitchen techniques. Throughout the course, they explored food preparation and presentation, adapted menus and recipes, and investigated cuisines from around the world alongside modern food trends.

Beyond cooking, students examined the many factors that influence food choices, including social, economic, psychological, and physiological considerations. In practice, they took part in twice-weekly cooking sessions, creating dishes that showcased both traditional and contemporary ingredients. These hands-on experiences were grounded in a growing understanding of nutrition, diet, and the importance of maintaining a healthy lifestyle.

## **Food and Hospitality**

#### Food and Nutrition 3

This year, Food and Nutrition 3 students have explored what makes up a healthy diet and how food choices impact health and wellbeing. A favourite part of the course has been using FoodWorks Online, a professional nutrition program, to analyse the diets of individuals. Students were able to compare results to the Nutrient Reference Values and see for themselves how small changes can make a big difference.

Of course, there was always plenty of food involved which was mostly healthy, though not always. During a food sociology task on how colour influences perceived flavour, students sampled confectionery to test the theory, proving that not all learning had to come from fruit and vegetables.

From day one, they immersed themselves in the dynamic world of hairdressing, developing practical skills and confidence through real-world experiences.

Students have explored a wide range of hair services during our weekly open salon days, where students work with real clients refining their techniques and professionalism – from revitalising conditioning treatments and foundational colouring techniques to the art of blow-drying and intricate braiding. Their creativity and enthusiasm were evident in the impressive hair transformations they produced for our statewide hair competition.

Beyond practical tasks, the course also focused on building essential employability skills. Students were encouraged to step outside their comfort zones, by going on work placement, preparing them for work and future apprenticeships in the industry. Through these work placements several students either gained paid holiday work or School Based Apprenticeships.

**Human Learning** – Students enjoyed learning about how humans learn and understand their own and others' behavioural responses through the topics of "Classical Conditioning" and "Operant Conditioning", particularly how fear is acquired and what can be done to un-condition those fears.

**Mid-Year Exams** – Most students did a fantastic job writing their first long exam in this subject and found that it was a useful experience, to get ready for their final exams.

Independent Project – Students investigated and conducted their own research on the topic of "Individual differences", with a focus on gender differences. Most students enjoyed the process of working independently on their own topic of interest and effectively communicated this process and their findings in a written psychological report. Several popular topics this year included different views between genders on stereotypes, male and female risk-taking behaviour, differences in emotional recognition, male and female performance in visuo-spatial task such as objects location, male and female task performance on memory tasks when experiencing emotional distractions, and many others!

Forgetting – During the Forgetting unit, students have learned several theories to explain why we forget and some of the strategies that we use to improve our retention. Some of the mnemonics that we have learned to use include narrative chaining and the method of loci. They are keen to use their new strategies for their upcoming exams!


### Why We Love Our International Student Program at Launceston College...

### Biology 3

Biology 3 was an exciting journey of discovery and growth! Using the LC Instructional Model, students moved seamlessly from "I Do" "We Do" to "You Do," building skills step by step. Independent projects sparked creativity and earned the Critical and Creative Thinking awards! Cloze reading exercises and vocabulary drills transformed tricky science terms into confidence boosters, improving reading fluency along the way. This year was full of challenges, collaboration, and proud moments. It wasn't just about learning biology, it was about thinking critically, exploring the world around us, and celebrating every achievement, big or small.



### **Physical Science**

Physical Science was a rollercoaster ride of a subject, with students expected to conserve their enthusiasm as we swapped back and forth between chemistry and physics units. Students engaged in many topics, including atomic structure, Newtonian motion, types of energy, chemical bonding, and stoichiometry. Some highlights include experiments going wrong, appreciating why cations are pawsitive but anions are negative, learning monks are great at resistance because of all the ohms, and seeing just how long your teacher can rant that weight is not the same as mass and everyone uses that word wrong.

### **Environmental Science**

A guest speaker from the Dept. of Natural Resources and Environment spoke about the importance of Tasmania's biosecurity, and a visit to an onshore Salmon Aquaculture Farm informed students of how our food can be produced sustainably and be better for the environment.









### Chemistry

When it comes to science puns, chemistry students are in their element. They know what you need to add to get a good reaction.

Chemistry was a step forward in the journey to understanding exactly why things in the world around us behave the way they do. Students gained insight into topics such as electrochemistry, thermochemistry, organic chemistry, and everyone's favourite stoichiometry. Always remember chemists are great problem solvers, as they know all the solutions.








### **Animal Care**

Electronics Bright Sparks have Innovative Projects in 2025

Students of Electronics have been designing and building some truly amazing projects this year, demonstrating a blend of creativity and technical skill. The e-lab has become a hub of innovation, buzzing with everything from programmed game

Some standout projects include Bryce's heliotropism-inspired tracking robots. This clever machine uses light-dependent resistors and sensors to pitch and yaw with a light source, much like a sunflower turns to face the sun. It's a fantastic example of applying principles from nature to robotics. Equally impressive was Josh's fantastic robotic feature Number 5 is alive that used ultrasound to pinpoint an object and servos to turn and look at it.

Flynn's creation was a fully functional binary adder, constructed with half and full adders and all those logic gates. This project gave students a hands-on understanding of the fundamental principles of architecture of the first computers.

The class also explored more playful but equally challenging projects. A flashing Pac-Man and Riley's LED business card holder brought art and electronics together, while Archer's impressive LED array showcased the students' ability to work with the multiplexor's complex circuitry. For those with a need for speed, Hamish's radio-controlled motor and servo creation and even Memphis's controlled rocket launcher provided an exciting way to test their skills in remote servo motor control and

The students have really opened themselves to new possibilities. Their enthusiasm and dedication have resulted in some incredible work that used C++ coding, electronics and engineering. The projects show students' efforts and the dynamic nature of the new Electronics curriculum. It's clear that these young innovators are building skills that will be essential

# **Computer Game Making**







Students in Games Design started the year learning about some of the fundamental programming techniques required to create games using Lua and the Love2D Engine, including Event Driven Games, State Machines, and Agent Based Games.


Students then collaborated on a range of game ideas before settling on three different games that they would then go on to develop in groups. The games were:

- A Platform Roguelike inspired by "Risk of Rain" and "Downwell".
- A Diesel-Punk Turn Based Roguelike called "Blood and Oil".
- A Soviet Inspired Top-Down Shooter.

Students used a range of game engines including Unity, Godot, and ToME to create their games, and additional tools such as LibreSprite, LMMS, and JSFXR to create graphics, music, and sound effects.

With several classes of eSports students available next door, the Games Design students were able to get valuable feedback on their games and incorporate this into their final products.

At the end of the year all students had been part of creating a successful and playable game, learned some new skills which they can take away from the class, and



# **Computer Graphics and Design**



This year's **Computer Graphics and Design** course was a dynamic journey, focused on both foundational skills and cutting-edge digital techniques. Students explored everything from **basic design principles to complex 3D modelling**, culminating in a diverse portfolio of creative projects.

Computer Graphics kicked off with students getting to grips with powerful software like Photoshop and Animate, significantly aided by the inclusion of a class set of **16-inch digital drawing tablets**. These tablets greatly improved their ability to create detailed work directly on the computer, moving beyond simple edits and enabling them to produce original digital art that showcased their developing skills. This 2D work was then built upon in **2D animation**, where they developed and animated their own characters, giving them a chance to tell visual stories. We also got hands-on with practical applications, with students designing surface graphics for real-world items like phone cases and T-shirts, bridging the gap between digital creation and physical products.

The most significant part of the year was the students' deep dive into **3D design**. Using Blender, they learned how to build and sculpt virtual objects from the ground up. This wasn't just about static models; they applied these skills to create intricate animations, showcasing their understanding of movement, lighting, and texture. The work created in this unit, often showcased in their final folios, really highlighted the students' ability to think in three dimensions and solve complex design challenges.

A highlight of the year was the Launceston College Digital Inclusion Hub design competition. Students competed to design the new hub's identity, with the winning design being chosen for display throughout the college. This project was a testament to the students' ability to not only create art but to solve a real-world design problem with creativity and strategic thinking.

The progress made this year reflects more than just technical skill; it highlights our students' growing confidence and problem-solving abilities. Through a curriculum that blended artistic fundamentals with professional-level software, they've not only created impressive portfolios but also developed the strategic and creative mindset essential for success in any design-related field.



# **Design and Production**

### Intro to Housing

This year, students explored the foundations of residential interior design through hands-on, project-based learning. They developed an eye for both function and aesthetics while working on a range of creative tasks. Projects included curating material boards, experimenting with interior design styles, designing and modelling tiny houses, creating outdoor shelters, and producing kitchen designs. Students also built their digital design skills through SketchUp modelling.

### Housing and Design 3

This year, Housing and Design 3 students explored a range of design projects, building their skills in visual communication and creative problem-solving. They investigated how space can be used effectively, how passive solar design can support sustainable living, and how aesthetic choices enhance a design outcome.

A major highlight was the Term 3 folio project. Students created their own design briefs and produced detailed folios that showcased contextual research, site analysis, precedent studies, design development, and final design solutions. With folios submitted for external assessment, Term 4 has seen the class preparing for their upcoming exam and celebrating all they've achieved this year.



# **Object Design**

Animation, sculpture, microarchitecture, and light design were just some of the exciting fields students explored this year as they responded to the 2025 university brief, "Adaptation." Throughout the year, students embarked on a creative journey, engaging deeply with the design process from both research and hands-on perspectives. Each student began to develop their own design language and personal aesthetic, learning to articulate and

reflect on their work and growth.

The year culminated in a vibrant public exhibition at the UTAS School of Creative Arts and Media, where students' dedication, creativity, and persistence were on full display. This event was a wonderful opportunity to celebrate every student's hard work and unique achievements. They all contributed to a rich and inspiring showcase of ideas and talent.





### **VET Construction Pathways**

This year in VET Construction Pathways, we've had the chance to learn so many new skills and experience what it's really like to work in the construction industry. The course has given us the opportunity to build up important abilities like reading plans, making calculations, working safely, communicating, and staying organised.

We've taken on a wide variety of practical tasks, from setting up profiles with dumpy and laser levels to building formwork for slabs, as well as hanging doors and fitting passage sets. Working both individually and in groups has taught us how important teamwork and problem-solving are on the job.

A big highlight for us was completing work placement. This gave us real experience in the industry, using the tools, techniques, and practices that builders and tradespeople use every day. These placements not only helped us improve our skills but also gave us a real taste of what future careers in construction could look like.

We'd like to thank the local construction companies that took us on for work placement and gave us the chance to learn on the job. We also want to thank our teacher Ben Luttrell for all the support. Thanks to the staff and the Technology Learning Area for all their support throughout the year.

### **Design and Production** - Metal: Crafting Skills for the Future

Students in the Design and Production - Metal course have demonstrated impressive growth in both technical ability and creative thinking this term. Through hands-on learning, they developed foundational skills in welding, using techniques such as Manual Metal Arc (MMA) and Gas Metal Arc (GMA) welding. They also became proficient in the use of hand tools, precision measuring equipment, and metalworking lathes.

### These skills were put into practice across three key projects:

- Wall Art Project Students designed and created decorative wall pieces using simple materials, producing visually striking and effective results.
- Minor Project Garden Art: Emphasising sustainability, students repurposed recycled metal to craft unique pieces of garden art.
- Major Project Functional Home Item: For their final task, students designed and constructed a practical item suitable for use in the home, combining utility with craftsmanship.

A strong focus was maintained on Workplace Health and Safety, with students consistently demonstrating safe work practices and proper use of Personal Protective Equipment (PPE).

Congratulations to all students for their dedication, creativity, and outstanding achievements in this subject.








### **Makers Workshop**


### **Design & Production Textiles**














### **Dance**

Michael is the long standing Guitarist for "The Voice" Australia, and has just completed a major and intensive component of the show. Michael is a highly respected musician and educator, who enjoys sharing his skills, knowledge and experiences across a wide range of audiences.

Michael's playing / touring experience and recording credits include: House guitarist for the world wide hit TV show "The Voice" (Australia) Delta Goodrem, Kelly Rowland, Madden Brothers, Jessie J, Ricky Martin, Keith Urban, Lionel Richie, Seal, Will-I-Am, Kylie Minogue, Ronan Keating, Marvin Priest (Musical Director), Roachford, Mica Paris, Rahsaan Patterson. Natalie Bassingthwaighte, Ricki-Lee, Jessica Mauboy, Brian McFadden, Deni Hines, Paulini and many more.

The four days with Michael in the music area proved to be exciting, engaging and highly beneficial to all music students, this time enabling him to work more closely and intensively across many aspects of musical performance, arranging, rehearsal, production and instrumental technique concepts. Michael also provided opportunities to share information and different approaches to numerous Music Industry considerations and concerns – particularly with regards to preparation, networking, collaborating with other artists and performance anxiety.

Each of the first two days involved a Q&A session with each class, followed by the opportunity for students to share and workshop their song material with Michael in a practical context.

Michael held an open workshop on Tuesday during lunch time in the Hall and all students were welcome to attend. This was an informal session in which Michael briefly shared some of his exciting and valuable experiences in a career that spans over 27 years, including "The Voice", from which he presented behind the scenes footage and anecdotes. The session also included a live performance with a small band made up of staff and students.

The third day provided a focus on rehearsal strategies, creating written music charts, arranging and recording. The final day was a fantastic culmination of formal performances from Michael in conjunction with our fantastic music staff and tutors. Students were presented with a 45 minute set of vocal and instrumental songs, with the opportunity for the performing musicians to musically interact, improvise and demonstrate important performance elements with the students.

Students explored a wide range of production techniques during our weekly studio and live sound sessions, collaborating with young performers to bring their ideas to life. From recording bands and layering tracks to mixing, mastering, and experimenting with electronic production, their passion and creativity shone through. Many of these projects became valuable opportunities for local student musicians to record their original songs, giving them professional-quality work to share and build on.

Beyond developing technical expertise, the course placed a strong emphasis on supporting young artists and encouraging collaboration. Students worked side by side with emerging musicians, helping them shape their sound while also building their own skills as producers and engineers. This supportive environment not only gave our audio students real-world experience but also nurtured the creativity of the artists they worked with.



Visitors were invited to delve into Spinks' captivating portraits and explore his creative narrative until March 22nd. Over six weeks, our college community actively engaged with the artist's work, fostering connections between artists and students. The Gallows exhibition space serves as an educational resource, enriching the experience of Launceston College's dynamic and emerging young art students across diverse mediums. Sucher and Sucher marked an exceptional start to our exhibition season program, uniting artist and student in a celebration of creativity.

#### Kevin Lund

#### – Clouds in the Road, Stones in the Sky

The Gallows at Launceston College hosted an intriguing exhibition, Clouds in the Road, Stones in the Sky, showcasing the visionary works of Tasmanian artist Kevin Lund. The exhibition offers a profound exploration of the intertwining of art and life, reflecting on the delicate balance between discipline and surrender. Through two distinct modes of expression - inks on paper and oil paint on carved and burnt wood - Lund navigates the complexities of existence. The meticulous repetition of ink marks symbolizes focus and discipline, a deliberate effort to quiet the noise within and without. Layers upon layers are

built, creating a surface that vibrates with intensity, challenging the viewer's perception. In contrast, the burning of wood represents a negotiation with the uncontrollable, a surrender to the unpredictable forces of life. Yet within this chaos, Lund discovers order and value, finding beauty in the unexpected. This body of work becomes a metaphor for the artist's journey, traversing the space between rigour and release in search of a harmonious balance. As viewers engage with the exhibition, they are invited to contemplate their own relationship with these opposing forces, ultimately finding resonance in the artist's quest for the elusive "sweet spot" where art and life converge.

#### Rob Ikin

#### - "Yet Another Short History...."

In his latest body of work, Rob Ikin accumulated ideas and revisited previous concepts, sometimes repurposing, or rejuvenating them, yet always maintaining a state of flux. His methods and concepts were never static, reflecting the ever-evolving nature of artistic expression.

The stories told through his art could be covert, open to interpretation, or overt, yet still open to multiple meanings. The artist strove to imbue their work with a profound sense of humanness, capturing its foibles, humour, aggressions, spiritual essence, joys, and sadnesses.

Using a variety of media—from paint, pencil, and collage to montage, photography, light boxes, ceramics, found objects, and digital mediums—they composed these pieces for the audience, inviting exploration and interpretation of the layers of meaning within.

## Visual and Performing Art Staff – Exploring Larapuna: An Artistic Response

Our recent exhibition provided a profound and transformative experience for our 15 visual and performing staff members. By engaging with an Aboriginal Leader who shared invaluable insights about the land at Larapuna, we deepened our understanding of this culturally rich and significant place.

Following this immersive learning opportunity, our staff members channelled the knowledge gained into their chosen art forms. This creative process allowed them to reflect on and respond to the wisdom and stories shared, resulting in a diverse and vibrant multi-art presentation.

The exhibition showcased the unique interpretations and artistic expressions inspired by Larapuna. Through painting, ceramics, performance, photography, digital and other media, our artists conveyed their personal connections to the land, inviting viewers to appreciate the profound cultural heritage and natural beauty of Larapuna.

## Josh Foley – Exhibition: Brain Hot; Brain Rot; Melting

Josh Foley's Brain Hot; Brain Rot; Melting was an eclectic and provocative exhibition that blurred boundaries between high art and pop culture. Drawing from neoclassical painting, street aesthetics, and Internet culture, Foley challenged viewers with a nondualistic lens on contemporary life. His diverse use of media of painting, sculpture, photography, drawing, film, and installation created a dynamic, immersive experience. The exhibition questioned artistic hierarchies with playful defiance: Why not show Salad Fingers beside Rembrandt? A highlight was Foley's alien alter ego, Xydep Xydahlia, who performed a sound piece on opening night alongside his band, XYZ. This fusion of music, performance, and visual art invited audiences to rethink the boundaries of artistic disciplines and cultural value. Foley's work was both intellectually engaging and refreshingly irreverent, offering a bold reimagining of what contemporary art can be.





## John Dobson & Leigh Dobson – Under the Pressure



Leigh and John Dobson's recent exhibition presented a quiet yet powerful resistance to hustle culture and the pressures of modern life. Each work captured a moment carved out for personal reflection, offering calm in contrast to the relentless drive for productivity. The Dobsons embraced art as both process and reward, translating tranquillity into visual form. Their collection invited viewers to pause, reflect, and reconnect with stillness. Recognising the weight many carry today, the exhibition became a gentle act of defiance, a peaceful pushback against the noise, creating space for contemplation and emotional rest.

#### Peter 'Stig' Cooper – Elemental



Elemental was a deeply atmospheric and instinctive exhibition that captured the ephemeral beauty of nature through abstract landscapes. The artist's connection to light, sky, and mood was palpable in each piece, evoking a sense of place without anchoring to geography. Windswept hills, turbulent seas, and fleeting clouds were rendered with oil and wax, using a palette knife to create texture and movement. The cool clarity of Nordic light and Tasmanian vistas

subtly informed the work, while music and instinct guided the process. This self-taught painter's studio became a sanctuary where emotion and environment merged on canvas.

Warwick Campbell

– On an Outgoing Tide



Warwick Campbell's On an Outgoing Tide was a haunting and thoughtprovoking exhibition that explored the tension between human behaviour and environmental fragility. Through large-scale graphite works—ranging from surrealist decalcomania to experimental graphite-oil sprays and traditional ceramic techniques, Campbell responded instinctively to a singular environmental experience. The pieces questioned our complicity in ecological degradation, asking whether ignorance or lack of scrutiny absolves responsibility. The interplay of light, texture, and form evoked a landscape both familiar and disturbed. This was not just a visual experience, but a moral reckoning, an invitation to reflect on the traces we leave behind.

## Will Horan – Rats Castle

Will Horan's Rats Castle offered a quiet yet powerful reflection on place, memory, and identity within Tasmania's central highlands. Drawing from personal experiences around Little Pine Lagoon and the plateau, Horan captured the understated beauty of inland landscapes, and the deep, often unexpected relationships formed with nature, particularly fish. Each work, though seemingly unremarkable at first glance, revealed layers of meaning tied to belonging

and Tasmanian-ness. As Horan travelled beyond, echoes of the plateau followed, reshaping his perception of other places. This exhibition was a heartfelt tribute to a rugged, windswept environment and the people who quietly love it.



Kathleen Uko - Where Memory Rests



Kathleen Uko's Where Memory Rests offered a meditative exploration of place, memory, and emotion through abstracted landscapes rooted in Tasmania's north and northeast. Her intuitive process allowed each canvas to evolve organically, shaped by remembered sensations rather than literal scenes. Layered brushwork and gestural marks conveyed the quiet drama of shifting skies, forested hills, and remote valleys. Uko's palette echoed both the natural world and the emotional undertones of recollection. The works invited viewers to find their own stories within the ambiguity, reflecting on how landscapes, internal and external, are carried within us long after we leave them.

#### Visual Art Department - 2025

The Launceston College Visual Art Department continues to thrive as a vibrant hub of creativity, innovation, and artistic exploration. In 2025, the department embraced a dynamic blend of traditional and contemporary practices, fostering an inclusive environment where students were encouraged to experiment across a wide range of media.

This year, students engaged in Level 2 and 3 courses in Ceramics, Painting, Drawing, Graphic Design, Photography, Mixed Media, Digital Art, and Printmaking. Whether working in 2D or 3D, analogue or digital, students were supported in developing both foundational skills and advanced techniques, always with a focus on personal expression and creative growth.

Real-world engagement remained a cornerstone of the program. Collaborations with local galleries and businesses offered students hands-on experience in curation, exhibition design, and professional practice. These partnerships enriched learning and connected students with Tasmania's vibrant arts community.

Our dedicated exhibition space, The Gallows, was a hive of activity throughout the 2024/25 season, hosting 10 major exhibitions. Featured artists included Bert Spinks, Kevin Lund, Rob Ikin, Josh Foley, John and Leigh Dobson, Peter 'Stig' Cooper, Warwick Campbell, Will Horan, and Kathleen Uko. These artists not only exhibited their work but also led workshops, generously sharing their creative processes with students. A highlight was Larapuna: An Artist Response to Land, a powerful staff-led exhibition.

Students also engaged with a wide range of galleries and exhibitions, including The Glover, QVMAG, ArtRage, MONA, TMAG, Sawtooth, Poimena, the Space Gallery, and our community partner, the Madeline Gordon Gallery. These experiences offered rich insights into both historical and contemporary art, inspiring students' own creative journeys.

Currently, over 140 Level 3 students across Art, Graphic Design, and Photography are preparing for their major exhibition and assessment. This showcase will celebrate the diverse talents and dedication of our student body.

The strength of the department lies in its passionate and professional staff, each practising artists and educators who mentor students with care and expertise. Through regular coursework, workshops, and masterclasses, students are supported in developing their portfolios and artistic identities. The department's commitment to nurturing individual voices ensures that each student feels seen, valued, and empowered to take creative risks.

The connection between Visual and Performing Arts at Launceston College is a vital force in fostering interdisciplinary creativity and collaboration. This synergy allows students to explore the intersection of visual storytelling, performance, and design, enriching both artistic practice and audience engagement. Joint projects, shared exhibitions, and cross-departmental workshops encourage students to think beyond traditional boundaries, cultivating a holistic understanding of the arts. This integrated approach not only enhances creative outcomes but also builds a vibrant, supportive community where diverse talents flourish. Together, these departments champion innovation, expression, and the transformative power of the arts in education.

We extend our sincere thanks to the artists who contributed to our community this year, and to our Patron of LC Arts, Philip Wolfhagen, for his ongoing support and advocacy. His presence continues to inspire both staff and students alike.
