
ANH315117 Ancient History 3









You will work through the following units as part of studying Ancient History:

Unit 1: Investigating the Ancient World

An introduction to the Ancient Mediterranean civilisations and how historians and archaeologists investigate the ancient world. What is history? What is a civilisation?

Unit 2: The Destruction of Troy

An examination of the geographical and historical context of Troy, key ancient sources, and the work of modern archaeologists at the site. Did the Trojan War actually take place?

Unit 3: Structure of an Ancient Society: Sparta

Study of the political, social, economic and cultural structure and practices of famous Sparta including the key features of weapons and warfare, women and families, and beliefs, rituals and funerary practices. Why was Sparta so feared in the ancient world?

Unit 4: Nature of Power and Authority

Research a leader in an ancient society to investigate their historical context and the way that they wielded their power and authority. Choose a leader from Assyria, China, Egypt, Greece or Rome.

How you'll be assessed:

Common types of internal assessments are:

- Quizzes
- Research reports
- Short written responses
- Essays

The external assessment for this subject is a 3-hour exam. The dates for external exams in November are non-negotiable.

To be successful in this subject you need:

- Well- developed research, reading and writing skills
- Consistent attendance
- A natural curiosity about the ancient world and a willingness to discuss your ideas

ASSESSMENT

Criterion-based assessment helps you to see how well you're meeting subject outcomes during your study. While there is continuous feedback to guide learning, final assessments focus on showing what you have achieved by the end of the year. Ratings are given as 'A', 'B', or 'C', based on course standards. A 'D' rating indicates partial achievement below a 'C', and a 'Z' means no evidence has been provided. You must achieve a Satisfactory Achievement (SA) or better to gain the literacy tick.

Schools follow TASC's quality assurance processes to keep standards consistent. More details are on the <u>TASC</u> <u>website</u>. Final awards are based on both internal and TASC-supervised external assessments.

Criteria

- 1. undertake inquiry in ancient historical issues
- 2. use historical ideas and concepts in discussing the ancient world
- 3. communicate historical ideas and information*
- 4. use evidence to support historical interpretations and arguments*
- 5. describe and assess differing historical interpretations on issues affecting the ancient world*
- 6. describe the nature and characteristics of an ancient civilisation*
- 7. assess the impact of human agency on an ancient society *
- 8. use resources and organisational strategies
- *Denotes an externally assessed criterion

In Ancient History there are 8 subject criteria which are assessed internally and 5 of these criteria are also assessed in the exam (total 13 ratings).

Final Achievement Award Requirements

EXCEPTIONAL ACHIEVEMENT (EA)

10 'A' ratings, 3 'B' ratings (4 'A' ratings, 1 'B' rating from external assessment)

HIGH ACHIEVEMENT (HA)

5 'A' ratings, 5 'B' ratings, 3 'C' ratings (2 'A' ratings, 2 'B' ratings, 1 'C' rating from external assessment)

COMMENDABLE ACHIEVEMENT (CA)

6 'B' ratings, 6 'C' ratings, 1 'D' rating (2 'B' ratings, 3 'C' ratings from external assessment)

SATISFACTORY ACHIEVEMENT (SA)

11 'C' ratings, 2 'D' ratings (3 'C' ratings from external assessment)

PRELIMINARY ACHIEVEMENT (PA)

7 'C' ratings, 1 'D' or 'Z' rating (15 TCE points but no literacy tick or ATAR points)

LIMITED ACHIEVEMENT (LA) Less than 7 'C' ratings (no TCE points or literacy tick)
