You will work through the following units as part of the subject

Module 1: Investigating the Ancient World

Students will examine how the ancient world is studied by looking at the practice of archaeology and examination of ancient sites. We study the ethical challenges in modern archaeology, specifically by looking at the 'Mungo Man' site in NSW. A study of Ancient Rome and sources on the Roman games is looked at in-depth.

Module 2: Into the Modern Era

Learners will undertake a study to examine developments of significance that led to the modern era. Colonialism and the spread of European ideas to the 'new world' will be looked at. Specifically, the industrial revolution and the creation of the United States are examined in-depth.

Module 3: Movements for change in the 20th century

Learners examine significant movements in the 20th century that led to change in society, including changes in people's attitudes and circumstances. The struggle for the women's vote will be examined though the UK and Australian suffragette movement. The course of study concludes with an in-depth study of the Vietnam war and its struggle for independence.

ASSESSMENT

Criterion-based assessment helps students see how well they're meeting course outcomes at the end of their study. While there is continuous feedback to guide learning, final assessments focus on showing what students have achieved by the end. Ratings are given as 'A', 'B', or 'C', based on course standards. A 't' indicates partial achievement below a 'C', and a 'z' means no evidence provided.

Schools follow TASC's quality assurance to keep standards consistent. More details are on the <u>TASC website</u>. Final awards are based on both internal and TASC-supervised external assessments.

Criteria

The assessment for *History* Level 2 will be based on the degree to which the learner can:

- 1. apply chronology, terms and concepts related to history
- 2. formulate, research and analyse historical questions
- 3. explain contestability of historical sources and evidence
- 4. describe historical perspectives, interpretations and representations
- 5. use appropriate communication skills and strategies
- 6. describe issues from the ancient past
- 7. describe the role of technology and individuals in defining the modern world
- 8. explain ideas and movements that led to change in the modern world.

Award Requirements

The final award will be determined by TASC from 8 ratings. The minimum requirements for an award in this course are as follows:

EXCEPTIONAL ACHIEVEMENT (EA)

6 'A' ratings, 2 'B' ratings

HIGH ACHIEVEMENT (HA)

3 'A' ratings, 4 'B' ratings, 1 'C' rating

COMMENDABLE ACHIEVEMENT (CA)

4 'B' ratings, 3 'C' ratings

SATISFACTORY ACHIEVEMENT (SA)

6 'C' ratings

PRELIMINARY ACHIEVEMENT (PA)

4 'C' ratings

A learner who otherwise achieves the ratings for an SA (Satisfactory Achievement) award but who fails to show any evidence of achievement in one or more criteria ('z' notation) will be issued with a PA (Preliminary Achievement) award.
