You will work through the following units as part of Housing and Design:

Unit 1: Design Communication

Learn how to effectively communicate design ideas through sketches, drawings, written design language, and digital tools like SketchUp, with a focus on clear visual presentation and annotation.

Unit 2: Design and Systems Thinking

Learn to approach design by considering how parts of a system interact, identify problems, brainstorm solutions, and apply systems thinking for efficient, functional designs.

Unit 3: Form and Function

Learn how to balance aesthetics with design functionality. Topics include kitchen design, universal design, tiny houses, and evaluating floor plans.

Unit 4: Passive Solar Design and Sustainability

Learn about passive solar design for cool temperate and hot humid environments.

Unit 5: Project Management

In this unit, you'll create a design folio, which will be externally assessed.

The external assessment for this subject is a 2-hour exam and design folio. The dates for external exams in November are non-negotiable.

ASSESSMENT

Criterion-based assessment helps students see how well they're meeting course outcomes at the end of their study. While there is continuous feedback to guide learning, final assessments focus on showing what students have achieved by the end. Ratings are given as 'A', 'B', or 'C', based on course standards. A 't' indicates partial achievement below a 'C', and a 'z' means no evidence provided.

Schools follow TASC's quality assurance to keep standards consistent. More details are on the <u>TASC</u> <u>website</u>. Final awards are based on both internal and TASC-supervised external assessments.

Criteria

The assessment for Housing and Design Level 3, will be based on the degree to which the learner can:

- 1. Communicate ideas and information using a range of techniques
- 2. Implement self-management strategies to complete individual and team projects
- 3. Analyse and apply features and principles which contribute to environmental sustainability within design decisions*
- 4. Apply architectural design principles relating to functional use of space*
- 5. Apply architectural design principles relating to aesthetics
- 6. Locate and analyse information about user needs and influences in design projects*
- 7. Use and document the design process*
- 8. Generate design solutions which respond to the brief and identified aims.*

Award Requirements

The final award will be determined by the Office of Tasmanian Assessment, Standards and Certification from 13 ratings (8 from the internal assessment, 5 from external assessment).

The minimum requirements for an award in Housing and Design Level 3 are as follows:

EXCEPTIONAL ACHIEVEMENT (EA)

10 'A', 3 'B' ratings (4 'A', 1 'B' from external assessment).

HIGH ACHIEVEMENT (HA)

5 'A', 5 'B', 3 'C' ratings (2 'A', 2 'B', 1 'C' from external assessment).

COMMENDABLE ACHIEVEMENT (CA)

7'B', 5'C' ratings (2'B', 2'C' from external assessment).

SATISFACTORY ACHIEVEMENT (SA)

11 'C' ratings (3 'C' from external assessment).

PRELIMINARY ACHIEVEMENT (PA)

6 'C' ratings.

A learner who otherwise achieves the ratings for a CA (Commendable Achievement) or SA (Satisfactory Achievement) award but who fails to show any evidence of achievement in one or more criteria ('z' notation) will be issued with a PA (Preliminary Achievement) award.
