You will work through the following units as part of Photography 3

Unit 1: Visual Thinking and Interpreting Art

Students will be introduced to DSLR camera's, the elements and principles of design and explore various artists, techniques and ways to comminate ideas through their photographs.

Unit 2: Investigation and Exploration

In this module students create their own artworks inspired by ideas, concepts, and observations while exploring various photographic approaches. You'll research and experiment with these approaches to develop your own unique concept to develop over the year.

Unit 3: Context and Resolution

In this module, you'll explore how art reflects different perspectives and contexts, including societal changes like globalisation and environmental issues. You'll develop your own cohesive artwork, refining your ideas and documenting your creative process using visual diaries and reflective critiques.

ASSESSMENT

Criterion-based assessment helps students see how well they're meeting course outcomes at the end of their study. While there is continuous feedback to guide learning, final assessments focus on showing what students have achieved by the end. Ratings are given as 'A', 'B', or 'C', based on course standards. A 't' indicates partial achievement below a 'C', and a 'z' means no evidence provided.

Schools follow TASC's quality assurance to keep standards consistent. More details are on the <u>TASC website</u>. Final awards are based on both internal and TASC-supervised external assessments.

Criteria

The assessment for Visual Art Level 3 will be based on the degree to which the learner can:

- 1. use the elements and principles of design to solve complex problems*
- 2. select and use technologies, techniques and conventions to express artistic intentions*
- 3. communicate ideas, emotions and information through artworks to affect and move audiences*
- 4. analyse, and creatively respond to cultural influences and artworks*
- 5. analyse art ideas and information
- 6. apply time management, planning and negotiation skills to Visual Arts activities
- 7. use reflective practice to inform artmaking
- 8. create and display a cohesive body of artwork*

Award Requirements

The final award will be determined by the Office of Tasmanian Assessment, Standards and Certification from 13 ratings (8 from the internal assessment, 5 from external assessment).

The minimum requirements for an award are as follows:

EXCEPTIONAL ACHIEVEMENT (EA)

10 'A' ratings, 3 'B' ratings (3 'A' ratings, 2 'B' rating from external assessment)

HIGH ACHIEVEMENT (HA)

5 'A' ratings, 5 'B' ratings, 3 'C' ratings (1 'A' ratings, 3 'B' ratings, 1 'C' rating from external assessment)

COMMENDABLE ACHIEVEMENT (CA)

6 'B' ratings, 6 'C' ratings (2 'B' ratings, 3 'C' ratings from external assessment)

SATISFACTORY ACHIEVEMENT (SA)

11 'C' ratings (3 'C' ratings from external assessment)

PRELIMINARY ACHIEVEMENT (PA)

6 'C' ratings

A learner who otherwise achieves the ratings for a CA (Commendable Achievement) or SA (Satisfactory Achievement) award but who fails to show any evidence of achievement in one or more criteria ('z' notation) will be issued with a PA (Preliminary Achievement) award.
